

PROTESTS SEAWAY SHIPPING
 WASHINGTON (AP)—A protest against shipments of government-owned surplus farm commodities through the St. Lawrence Seaway was raised Thursday by Representative Clark Thompson. The Texas Democrat told the House merchant marine committee that coastal cities had spent large sums developing their ports and that shifting of surplus food shipments from them to Great Lakes ports would be unfair.

Fleming Goes To Conference

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada will be represented by Finance Minister Fleming and probably Trade Minister Churchill at a Sept. 22-23 meeting of Commonwealth finance and trade ministers, it was learned Monday.

The London conference also will include the first meeting of the Commonwealth health economic consultative council, a body that the Montreal conference on commonwealth trade and economic affairs agreed to establish last year. The council is to co-ordinate all the consultative machinery on economic and trade matters.

Canada is understood to have no particular matters to press at the London conference. It is scheduled for two days but may be extended by a day depending on circumstances.

Discussions are expected to range over a wide field of finance, economics and trade, taking in at the same time a review of the trade liberalization moves that grew out of the Montreal conference at which a number of commonwealth countries agreed to relax currency restrictions.

The Canadian ministers and their advisers are also understood to be interested in hearing from Britain of arrangements among the Outer Seven—Britain, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Switzerland, Austria and Portugal—for tariff reductions and trading quotas.

The Outer Seven trade arrangement was undertaken as a trading answer to the European common market composed of France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg and Italy, which plans a common protective tariff against goods shipped in from non-members.

The Outer Seven aim at a 20-per-cent tariff reduction among members but at present have made no move towards a standard tariff wall against non-members.

However, fears have been expressed in this country that the new trading arrangements may cut into markets for Canadian products, particularly agricultural produce.

CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add 3/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 3/4 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 lbs. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on a lightly-floured board and divide into 2 equal portions; shape each

portion into a long roll about 1 1/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

Six-Hour Day Is Requested

NEW YORK (AP)—The International Longshoremen's Association (Ind.) Monday asked a six-hour day at the same rates of pay as for eight hours.

The union's demands were offered to the New York Shipping Association on behalf of 25,000 New York dockers. The union again asked for industry-wide bargaining to cover 70,000 Longshoremen from Maine to Texas—a proposal always turned down in the past by the shippers.

The union asked that the present eight-hour scale of \$22.40 a day be continued for a six-hour work day.
