Thinning Of Buffalo Herd Now Underway

LAMONT, Alta., Dec. 15—(CP)—A man with a rifle throws some hay from a horse-drawn sleigh, then takes a bead on a 1,900-pound buffalo bull.

As the animal falls, other buffalo in the immediate vicinity placidly go on chewing hay, oblivious to the chance the next rifle crack may turn them into buffalo steaks or a policeman's winter coat.

Thinning of the buffalo herd at nearby Elk Island National Park is under way. The herd, numbering 1,700 animals, is the largest controlled buffalo herd in the world.

About 625 buffalo, mainly bulls five years and over, are being killed during the 10-day cutting of the herd. One marksman, A. E. Roberts, is dispatching the lot.

Mr. Roberts concedes that hitting a buffalo from a range of 10 to 25 yards is no trick at all. But the shaggy animals have to be hit in the right place—a target "about the size of a snuff box," or three inches in diameter.

The spot is either between the eyes or between the horn and the eye.

It's a prosaic business compared with the rip-roaring day of muzzle loaders and bow and arrow on the open plains.

After a buffalo is killed it is hauled to a new \$60,000 abattoir, where it is processed by packing-house employees.
