THE ITALIANS IN AFRICA.

Great Britain has looked With Favor Upon the Italian Campaign.

LONDON, March 13.—The important announcement made by the Times this morning, and copied by the Associated Press last night, that the Egyptian troops would advance up the Nile forthwith to occupy Dongola, was officially confirmed by the foreign office today.

"It need hardly be said that the advance upon Dongola will greatly benefit the Italians, and the British government must also had the desirable object in view in assenting to the British advance."

Taken in connection with the evidence that Count Goluchowski has succeeded by his visit to Berlin in strengthening the ties of the existing friendship, Great Britain's diversion in Egypt in favor of a member of the dreadnaught is regarded as extremely significant.

It must be borne in mind, however, that Great Britain has looked with a favorable eye upon the Italian campaign in Africa all along, though she has hitherto declined active assistance, as an Italian success would tend to add the prestige of European arms in Africa, and consequently to the strengthening of British interests in the Soudan.

There have been often renewed reports that Great Britain had sent to Italy the port of Zula, in the Straits of Bab-el-Mandeb, which Italy much desired to obtain in order to facilitate her operations in Abyssinia.

Baron de Courcel, the French Ambassador in London, paid a long visit to the Foreign Office this afternoon, to which importance is attached in the public mind. The visit is supposed to be connected with the proposed advance upon Dongola.

A Better Feeling at Madrid. LONDON, March 13.—The Standard publishes a despatch from Madrid saying sincere satisfaction is visible among all classes at the improved relations in connection with the Washington conference.

THE ABYSSINIAN WAR.

General Baratieri Talks About the Defeat Upon the Italian Campaign.

ROME, March 13.—According to the Agenzia d'Italia, thirty thousand derisives are investing Kassala, the town captured from them some time ago by the Italians.

General Baratieri, who was superseded in command of the Italian forces in Africa in an interview at Massawa on the reasons for attacking the Abyssinians at Adowah, said the information he received led him to believe that it was easy to occupy the positions to-day.

The Tribune publishes an interview with Gen. Baratieri, in which he denied that the government urged him to attack the Abyssinians. He added that all his generals favored making the attack.

The victory for the Italians had been partially won and was virtually assured when the native battalions became panic-stricken. This produced disorder among the Italian troops.

Gen. Baratieri declared he had nothing to add to the existing report of the defeat he was on the verge of committing suicide. He remembered his family and wished to spare them shame.
