## Court Cases At Georgetown

At the magistrate's court in Georgetown on Wednesday a motorist from Lorne Valley, charged with having insufficient lighting, was fined \$5 and costs.

A party from Gasperaux and another from Pt. Pleasant, charged with driving while impaired, were fined \$50 and costs together with an automatic suspension of the drivers' licenses for three months.

A party from Hopefield, charged with possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased at the vendors, was fined \$25 and costs, and a party from Charlottetown charged with the same offense was fined \$20 and costs.

A party from Abney, charged with driving while intoxicated had the information withdrawn.

A party from Abney, charged with driving while his license was cancelled and a party from Charlottetown charged with intoxication, had their cases withdrawn.

One party from Pt. Pleasant pleaded guilty and two others from the same place pleaded not guilty when they were charged, under the Excise Act with being in the possession of a still, had their case adjourned for a week. ## Shows Highway Safety Film At Home, School Ass'n

At a meeting of Queen Charlotte High School Home and School Association held in the school library last evening, Mr. Philip Barlow, chief examiner of the Motor Vehicle Branch showed two splendid films dealing with highway safety and also a number of stills taken locally. His running commentary on the films added to their effectiveness as an educational medium. The possibilities of receiving school instruction on highway safety is to be fully explored.

## Kinsmen Club Dinner Meeting

Farrell Gaudet, public relations officer of the Maritime Central Airways spoke briefly before the Kinsmen Club in describing the history of the educational film shown at their dinner meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. The film, which was on loan from the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Service, vividly reproduced types of aircraft and dealt with the expansion of air travel throughout Canada and connecting areas.

Clive Cadmore reported on the dance recently held by the club and also on the Christmas project now in operation. Frank Burge made a report on committee activities dealing with a proposed Christmas celebration and ladies night.

## Seasonal Increase In Loca: Unemployed

Keeping step with advancing winter the number of unemployed has increased in King's and Queen's counties according to the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Service. The increase is reflected in the mounting list of unemployment insurance benefit claims from approximately 650 in the last week of November to about 850 as of yesterday, Thursday.

Well over fifty per cent of the claimants are residents of rural King's and Queen's Counties, the remainder live in Charlottetown. The total is a shade lower than at the same date a year ago.

Prince County comes under the administration of the Summerside National Employment office and the county figures are not included in the Charlottetown total.

In spite of the climb in unemployment, the Charlottetown office placed 262 people in jobs during the month of November, one hundred of whom were women. Construction work absorbed about one hundred of the 162 men placed by the office.

Another outlet was found in the demand for woodsmen, to work at Camp Gagetown, the new military base in New Brunswick. Including those recruited by the Charlottetown office in late October and through November until yesterday, Thursday, 85 men have gone forward to the woods clearing job.

Further contracts for the clearing of an additional 18,000 acres of timber land have just been let, and the demand for men continues. Although seasonal unemployment is fairly well distributed in the province, Charlottetown with its more concentrated population has the biggest share of idle men. The new Federal Building is employing about sixty workers at the present time, but cannot give employment to all of the Charlottetown people seeking it, nor to the numerous other applicants from all parts of the countryside.

Though many laborers are idle most tradesmen are busy, particularly carpenters, very few of whom are obtainable at the present time. This is particularly true of first class carpenters capable of doing finish work. Most of the large Charlottetown merchants are arranging for extra sales-people for Christmas, which will put money in many pockets for the great holiday season.

The Charlottetown Post Office too will be engaging about forty men to help out during the Christmas rush.
