NOTES AND COMMENTS.

EX-CHIEF JUSTICE DEVILLIERS, of Cape Colony, and Paul Botha, an ex-member of the Orange Free State Volksraad, have issued public appeals to the fighting leaders of the Boers to lay down their arms and allow the restoration of peace. This is a good sign.

The following lines from Shakespeare are applicable in the present election contest:

"Thrice is he armed that hath his quarrel just;
 And he but naked, though locked up in steel
 Whose conscience with injustice is corrupt."

For the new winter uniforms which the German Government has ordered for the China troop, the khaki color is discarded for a new color termed "field grey." This is a light greenish-grey, with a certain proportion of white, which looks better than khaki, and is equally indistinguishable on the field.

The Queen's speech at the opening of the present session of Parliament was as follows:

"My Lords and Gentlemen:
 "It has become necessary to make further provision for the expenses incurred by the operation of my armies in South Africa and China. I have summoned you to hold a special session in order that you may give your sanction to the enactments required for this purpose. You will not enter into other public matters requiring your attention until the ordinary meeting of the parliament in the spring."

The committee of the Corn Exchange has added its voice to that of the council of the Board of Trade

in a demand that efforts be put forth to secure for Canadian farm products an entrance into the German market on the same footing as other nations. It is remarked by the Montreal Gazette that the one accomplishment of the Laurier Government in the field of our foreign trade is being more and more felt as a grievance. The worst of the trouble, too, is that it will not be easy to restore the old conditions. It is one thing to splurge into a difficulty; it is quite another to come successfully out of it.

SPEAKING of the people of Australia, Bishop Courtney describes them as men of great energy, whose whole thought is to make their native land prosperous. They are for Australia first, second and last, and today they are making rapid strides in advance. Naturally hospitable, they did everything in their power to make Canada's representatives, stay as pleasant as possible, and their efforts met with the highest success. The war in Africa has done wonders to bring about a friendly feeling towards Canada. The sending of contingents to the front by the two most important colonies of the empire has tended to make both feel that they have something in common, and to this spirit Bishop Courtney attributes not a little of the interest manifested in his visit. The Australians were most loyal in their feelings towards the Mother Country, and the war has done much to cement the whole island on a firmer political basis.

The correspondent of the Chicago Record in London says:

"Cecil Rhodes as the pacifier of South Africa promises to be one of the realities of the near future in British Imperial affairs. From an officer of high rank who had just returned from the Cape the Record correspondent has received the following statement:
 "South Africa seriously needs the services of the great peacemaker.

My intimate knowledge of Mr. Rhode's opinion at this moment causes me to have little doubt that he intends to take advantage of the unparalleled opportunity now open to him. He may be expected to come out shortly as an advocate of conciliatory measures likely to end the war, and to make the situation afterward tolerable to both races. Even the Dutch, as much as they hate Cecil Rhodes, feel that there is no other man who could succeed in the undertaking suggested. There is absolutely no doubt that the wave of conciliation is rapidly gathering strength."
