

Before proceeding further, I would earnestly impress on the mind of your Lordship, that in making the present appeal I am animated by no acerbic or sectarian feeling.

I confess, my Lord, that in the treatment of this question many difficulties arise. For, taking as our guide the Articles of the Anglican Church, I find therefrom that "Christ did truly ascend into Heaven, and there sitteth, until he return to judge all men at the last day."

Your Lordship may perhaps be aware that several Lectures, delivered in London by twelve learned, and I am willing to believe, truly pious Clergymen of the Church of England, advocating the doctrine of the Millennium, are in course of public reading in this town, and the fact of their being dedicated, "by permission," to the Lord Bishop of Ripon, should at least entitle them to a respectful hearing from all, as well as the advocates of opposers of the doctrine in question.

It now remains for me to apologise for having taken up so much of your Lordship's time and attention. Yet, I would fain flatter myself that your Lordship will not think the foregoing remarks to be altogether unworthy of notice.
