### Rural Parish Rally Held at Tignish

The Rural Parish Rally at Tignish was opened with Solemn Mass celebrated by Rev. Dr. Monaghan, of Miscouche, on July 22nd, assisted by Rev. R. F. McDonald, of Indian River, Deacon and Rev. P. J. McKenna, Lot 7, Sub-deacon. The sermon was delivered by Rev. J. A. Gaudet of Bloomfield and words of welcome by the Pastor, Rev. J. A. MacDonald.

After Mass the Rally opened with a Mission Crusade demonstration in Tignish Hall for the men and in St. Mary's Hall for the women. The work of the Canadian Catholic Student's Mission Crusade was ably reviewed by the young boys and girls, after which the Rally was opened, for the men by Rev. G. J. McLean and for the women by Rev. J. D. McNeill.

Valuable papers were read as follows: "Catechism of the Church" by Rev. Urban Gillis, Wellington; "Survey of Holy Name Society" by Mr. Elmer Pineau, Summerside and Mr. E. J. DeRoche, Tignish; "Review of Adult Education Activities in the Province" by Rev. Dr. Murphy of St. Dunstan's University and a paper prepared by Dr. Croseau of St. Albert's University and Fr. G. W. G. College read by Rev. Gaudet Monaghan. An interesting review of the co-operative movement in the fishermen's union was given by Mr. C. P. McCarthy of Tignish.

Lively discussion on the papers was taken part in by the clergy and also by Mr. S. R. Burke, Alberton, Mr. Wilfred Curran, a teacher in Western Canada, Mr. J. A. Bernard, Tignish, Mr. James McGrath, St. Louis, Mr. Peter Gallant, Egmont Bay, Mr. James McCordie, Middleton, and Mr. G. A. Ready, Tignish.

At the Ladies conference in St. Mary's Hall in the afternoon a survey of women's parish activities was presented by Mrs. S. R. Burke of Alberton, Miss Hilda W. Gillis, B. A. of Grand River. Considerable discussion followed these papers by Mrs. Austin McDonald, Mrs. L. J. Murphy, Mrs. S. R. Burke, Mrs. Frederick Conroy, Mrs. E. J. McTague, Mrs. James McGrath, Mrs. Timothy Conway, Miss C. Ar-enault, Mrs. H. McLigan, Mrs. Harry O'Brien, Mr. John Muligan and others.

The following resolutions were moved, seconded and carried jointly by delegates representative of both men and women:

1st: That a central library for Catholic literature on teaching catechism be established and that a summer school of two weeks' training for teachers in teaching catechism be opened up in our convents and in St. Dunstan's University; and that every Catholic home subscribe for a Catholic newspaper.

2nd: That this assembly strongly recommend the formation of Study Clubs in all school districts and urges all members to take full advantage of the courses and direction to be provided this fall and winter by the Adult Education League of Prince Edward Island.

3rd: That societies in each parish as soon as possible formulate plans and obtain suggestions in connection with Adult Education suitable for their local needs.

4th: That we recommend Credit Unions as a means of promoting thrift and providing credit facilities for farmers and fishermen.

5th: That recommendation be made to the authorities of St. Dunstan's University to supply one or two members of its faculty to develop study groups in rural parishes.

6th: That handicrafts, home cooking and interior decorating be a special study of each ladies' study circle.

7th: That on the part of both men and women a more active interest be taken in the district school thus promoting a helpful rivalry in making each respective school the best possible, the exterior and grounds to be looked after by the men, interior improvements to be cared for by women.

8th: That in order to foster intelligent co-operation between parents, teachers, and pupils, we recommend the holding of teacher-parent meetings from time to time and ask women's societies to promote this project.

A general consensus of the meetings was that we utilize the valuable sources of information and assistance provided by government agencies particularly in regard to our rural population should be farming and fishing in which all deeply interested.

An interesting phase of the day's program was the display of handicraft work by the parishes of Mont Carmel and Egmont Bay.

For many years the family resided in Albany and were most highly esteemed in the community. About thirty years ago Mr. Huestis came to Summerside and was employed with Joseph Read and Co. He had charge of their produce office at the east end and many thousands of bushels of oats have been graded by him. He was at his work up till a short time ago.

The decease was of a reserved disposition but had many friends who will be grieved to hear of his passing. There are left to cherish his memory, his sorrowing widow, formerly Miss Georgie Lefurgey; two sons, Frank and Roy in Summerside; two daughters, Mrs. Fred Harvey, Cape Traverse and Miss Jesse Huestis of Summerside and Louis of Lethbridge, Alta., and four sisters, Mrs. Arnold Lefurgey at the Mawley House, Summerside, Mrs. Gavin Walker, Crapaud, Mrs. Luke Keith, Needham, Mass., and Mrs. Emily Huestis who is at present at home. Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved family in their sorrow. The funeral is taking place on Thursday at 2:30 p. m. at the United Church Summerside.

### Synod To Meet Next Year In New Glasgow

FACTOU, N. S., July 27 — The 33rd synod of the Presbyterian Church of the Maritime Provinces decided at its concluding session today to meet next year in New Glasgow, N. S.

For five days 54 ministers and 29 elders meeting here discussed church problems, heard papers concerning church history and work, and participated in ceremonies commemorating the 150th anniversary of the arrival of Rev. Dr. James Drummond MacGregor, Pictou County's first Presbyterian minister.

Papers were read today by Rev. J. M. Kirk on "Early Presbyterianism in New Brunswick" prepared by Rev. G. S. Mitchell of Campbellton, N. B., by Dr. Max MacCormac of Sydney on "Presbyterian Pioneers in Cape Breton," and by Dr. W. Bell Dawson dealing with recollections of his father, Sir William Dawson, former principal of McGill University.
