Americanized English Newspapers.

LONDON, May 14.—At the annual dinner of the Newspaper Society this evening Mr. Harry Furness, the newspaper artist and illustrator, depreciated the growth of Americanism, which, he said, was "eating the root out of the honest English journalism."

McKinley Aggressive.

NEW YORK, May 13.—A special from Hot Springs, Va., says: President McKinley has sent a despatch to General Otis at Manila, instructing him to push the war into the interior of Luzon and capture or kill every fighting Filipino.

Feeling in Newfoundland.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 13.—The people of Newfoundland are enthusiastic over the complete vindication given by the report of the royal commission to their agitation for the removal of French fishing rights on the west coast. The ministry of the colony confidently anticipates important proposals at an early date for the settlement of the dispute from Joseph Chamberlain, Imperial Secretary of State for the colonies.

Tired of Life at 120.

IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Spanish Troops in a Tight Place.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Advices from Zambuga state that the insurgents attacked American troops on the 11th inst., with quick-firing guns and arms captured from Spanish gunboats. The Spanish general and two officers were wounded, and there were a few casualties among the troops.
The Spanish garrison is now besieged. Its water supply is cut off and the troops are calling for relief.
The despatch conveying this information is signed by General Otis.

Death of a Noted Warrior.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—A cable was received at the Japanese legation yesterday announcing the death of Gen. Viscount Kawakami, chief of the headquarters staff of the Imperial army of Japan. Gen. Kawakami rendered his country brilliant service during the China-Japanese war as vice chief of headquarters staff. He was regarded as one of the most famous soldiers of his time.

Will it Hit the Mark?

LONDON, May 12.—The Spanish Government, according to a despatch from Madrid to the Daily Mail, has ordered 20 samples of a new Spanish-invented rapid fire gun, which it is said, pierces 6 centimetres of Harveyized steel at a distance of 2,000 feet.

A BIG SENSATION.

Report of ex-President Cleveland's Death—No Truth in it.

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 15.—Telegraphic enquiries poured into Toledo from all parts of the country yesterday asking whether the rumor that ex-President Cleveland had died during the afternoon was correct. The Associated Press used every possible means to locate the foundation of the story and has been unable to find any. Mr. Cleveland, according to the rumor, died suddenly during the afternoon at Middlebas Island, in Lake Erie. From every point near the island the rumor was unconfirmed.
PRINCETON, N. J., May 15.—A telegram has reached Mrs. Cleveland from Sandusky, Ohio, stating that Mr. Cleveland is all right.

American Retaliation.

KINGSTON, J. J., May 13.—Representatives interpellated the government as to whether it intends to take steps to urge upon the Imperial Government the necessity for securing United States reciprocity before it is too late. The reply was that the government will do so. After the council adjourned the representatives in a body interviewed the governor representing the gravity of the situation and the popular demand for prompt and effective action to avert United States retaliation.

Coming Home.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 13.—Upon enquiry, it was ascertained that Secretary Long had last evening cabled Admiral Dewey permission to return at once to the United States. He has been relieved of the obligation of remaining at Manila until the Philippine commission completes its work. He is not even required to await the cessation of hostilities. It is estimated at the Navy Department that Dewey will reach the United States in time for a national demonstration on the fourth of July next.

Irregular Ritualists.

LONDON, May 12.—The House of Commons yesterday, by a vote of 310 to 156, defeated the second reading of the Church Discipline bill. Subsequently the House adopted without division a Government amendment to the bill, to the effect that unless the efforts which the Archbishop and Bishops are now making to secure due obedience by the clergy are not speedily effectual, further legislation will be required in order to maintain observance of the existing laws of the Church and realm.

LONDON, May 15.—The Board of Trade enquiry into the cause of the loss of the Stella, wrecked on the Casquet Rocks, has reached the judgment that the ship was not kept to the course set and was not navigated with seamanlike care, going at an excessive rate of speed in fog.

Sugar in Australia

BRISBANE, Queensland, May 13.—The returns show that 82,000 acres of land under cultivation will produce 164,000 tons of sugar. Queensland has increased its yield by half a ton an acre over last season.

Forced to Eat Grass.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 13.—the condition of the famine sufferers in the Eastern provinces is appalling. Typhus and scurvy are now on rampart among the starved inhabitants, who are dying by scores. The inhabitants of the Samara district are reported to be eating grass.

The Pope's Health.

LONDON, May 13.—A letter from Cardinal Vaughan, at Rome, says the Pope's recovery in mind and body is surprising, and there is no present ground for the foreboding reports about his condition.

Killed by Corsets.

NEW YORK, May 11.—Tight lacing is thought to have caused the death of Charles F. Stewart, banker, amateur actor, and one of the leading men socially in Passaic, N. J. He was found dead in bed, and the use of corsets, made necessary by his female part in a burlesque in which he had participated, it is supposed, brought on attack of apoplexy.
