

NB-P.E.I. Tourney Today

About 183 golfers will tee-off today at the Charlottetown Golf Club in the new Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Amateur and Open Golf Tournament.

Four important championships and three spots on the Willingdon Cup team will be up for grabs as the large field of entries begins to leave the tee early this morning.

Titles to be decided are the amateur, the open, the professional and the junior. John Sears of Fredericton has already earned himself a position of the Willingdon team by virtue of his victory in the sectional tournament held recently in New Brunswick. The remaining three positions will go to the three top amateurs.

An N.B. - P.E.I. Senior title will also be decided. Golfers over 50 years of age are eligible for senior competition.

All three Maritime Provinces are well represented and there are quite a few entries from other parts of Canada and the U.S.A.

About 50 Charlottetownians will be entered and among them is the golfer who will be highly rated to retain the Professional and Open title he won with a record shattering score last year at Riverside in St. John. Cecil (Bubby) Dowling, professional at the Charlottetown Club, since the Riverside course in '56 with a blistering 72-hole score of 285 and his play in practice rounds indicates that Bubby will be in the thick of the battle. Dowling has fired rounds of 82 and 69 in the past few days over the 18 hole course at Belvedere.

Dowling will lead a field of eight professionals which includes Pete Kelly, E. MacCluskey, Aroostook Valley, A. Ogilvie of Restigouche, J. R. Smith of Amherst, Don Riverside and Jim Walherst, Don Riverside and Jim Walker of Kentville.

The main core of entrants will be from the amateur ranks. Among the top local golfers swinging for a chance in the Willingdon Cup competition being held at Winniepee this year will be Island amateur champ Don MacDonald, Art MacKenzie, Frank MacInnis and Bill (Pud) Beer. The Island wasn't represented on the team

last year, but with a home course as an added advantage one of the above quartet could well win a trip to Winniepee. MacKenzie and Beer are veterans of Willingdon Cup play while MacDonald and MacInnis are looking for their first laurels.

The fairways and greens of Belvedere are in excellent shape thanks to the know-how and hard work of superintendent John MacDonald, and expert in greenskeeping.

The tournament is under the supervision of the N.B.-P.E.I. tournament committee which is directed by John Wostenholm, President of the N.B.-P.E.I. Golf Association.

This evening at the Charlottetown Hotel a banquet and the annual meeting with election of new officers will be held.

Eighteen holes will be played each day of the tournament and the top 12 golfers (amateur, and professional will swing into 18 more Wednesday afternoon to decide top honors.

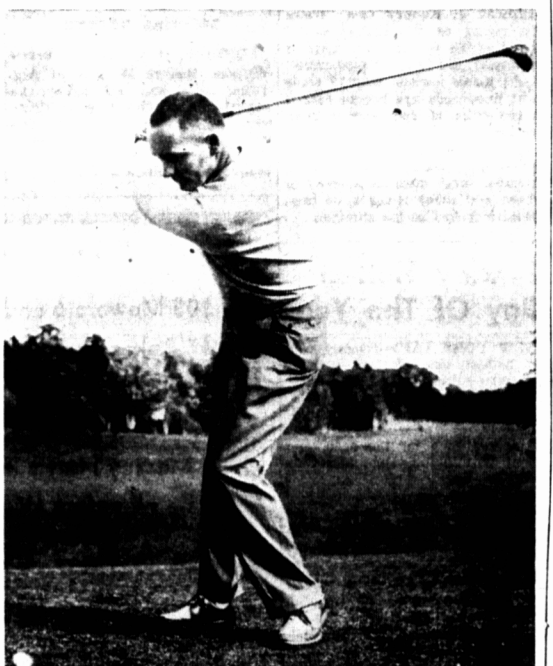

set he lost. He dropped his service
in that one and conceded it.
Gonzales broke Hoad's service
only three times, once in each of
the sets he won.

Cincinnati Moves Up On NL Leaders; Yanks Split

Cincinnati Redlegs closed in on the front runners in the dizzy National League pennant race Sunday, sweeping a doubleheader from Philadelphia Phillies 4-2 and 6-4 to move into fourth place with two games behind pace-setting Milwaukee.

The Braves retained their full game margin over runner-up Brooklyn, battling New York Giants to a split in their doubleheader as Chicago Cubs held the Dodgers even in their twin bill.

The Braves came from behind to win the nightcap 7-4 after the Giants had won the opener 5-4. Brooklyn, with a five-run fourth inning, won the second game 7-2 after the Cubs had taken the first game 5-4.

Only Pennsylvania's curfew law prevented St. Louis from moving into a second-place tie with Brooklyn. The Cardinals won the opener 7-3 in 10 innings and were leading Pittsburgh 11-2 with one out in the top of the ninth when the nightcap was called by the 7 p.m. curfew.

BOSTON SHUT OUT
Chicago White Sox climbed to within 4½ games of the American League-leading New York Yankees, shutting out Boston for the second straight day, 3-0, while Cleveland was holding the Bronx-ties to a split. The fourth place Indians came from behind to defeat New York 7-4 after the Yankees had won the opener 4-3.

Kansas City and Baltimore divided a doubleheader, the Athletics winning the second game 5-2 after the Orioles had won the first game 7-2. Detroit nipped Washington 6-5 in 10 innings when rookie pitcher Jim Heise walked across the winning run with the bases full.

Heavy hitting by Johnny Logan and Del Crandall averted a double loss for Milwaukee. The pair got half of Milwaukee's 16 hits in the nightcap. Logan having a perfect five-for-five, including a homerun. It was Crandall's two-run homer off Johnny Antonelli that put the Braves ahead 5-4, in the eighth. Hank Sauer's pinch single scored two in the ninth to win the first game for the Giants.

Gus Bell walloped two home runs, Brooks Lawrence won his 11th and Art Fowler his first of the year in Cincinnati's sweep. The Phillies, who now have lost six of their last seven, fell into fifth place 3½ games behind.

7th DEFEAT
Robin Roberts suffered his seventh successive defeat and 13th of the season in the opener. He served up two home run pitches—to Bell and George Crowe—for a total of 28 this season.

Don Blasingame drove in four runs with a two-run homer and a bases loaded 10th inning single to lead the Cards to their first game victory. Lindy McDaniel, St. Louis' 50,000 bonus pitcher, scattered six hits and contributed four himself in the abbreviated nightcap. Stan Musial did not appear in the second game lineup but his National League record of 882 consecutive games still has a chance to be prolonged provided he makes an appearance when the game is resumed Aug. 27.

Runless five-inning relief pitching by Clem Labine and Duke Saldier's pinch single with the bases loaded in the fourth highlighted

the Dodgers' second game victory after home runs by Walt Morin, Chuck Tanner and Lee Walli had given the Cubs the first game. Mor Drabowsky, celebrating his 22nd birthday, received credit for Chicago's victory, his first over the Dodgers.

SEVENTH SHUTOUTS
Jim Wilson made it two shutouts in a row for Chicago when he blanked the Red Sox on three hits. Larry Doby singled in one run and scored another after hitting a double.

A three-run triple by Bobby Avila brought the Indians from behind in a four-run sixth of the nightcap before the biggest baseball crowd in Cleveland in two seasons, 81,670. Gil McDougald and Elson Howard homered for the Yankees in the opener but it was a bases-loaded walk to Mickey Mantle in the sixth that pushed across what proved to be the winning run.

A pinch two-run homer by Bo Cerr in the seventh broke a 1-1 tie and gave Kansas City its second game victory, spoiling Baltimore's chance to go into a fifth place tie.

Ann's Dream Goes Fastest Mile Of '57 Season Sat.

One of the largest crowds to watch harness racing in Summerside was in attendance at Summerside Raceway Saturday evening to witness some very close finishes, and the fastest mile of the 1957 season. Ann's Dream driven by Geo. Callbeck racked up a time of 2:09 in the first dash of the Free - For - All Pace. Willard MacDonald's mare also won the other dash which was sponsored by Lane's Bakeries. Propane in winning the second dash of the A Pace set a new record for Lloyd Small's gelding, going the mile in 2:14 1/5. Another feature of the race card was the dead heat run by Miss Russell and Tommy Shanter in the second heat of the B Trot. Miss Russell came around the final turn into the stretch more than a length ahead but Tommy Shanter and Ruthie's First stormed down the stretch to close the gap. Ruthie's First was only a half head behind the other two. An accident occurred in the fifth dash when Kathy Clegg driven by Enzor Bowness stumbled and pitched headlong in the stretch. Dr. Wilfred C and Rena Bell piling up behind the Clegg sulky. George Sobey and Elmer Newson were the other drivers involved. Sobey and Bowness were taken to the hospital but Newson escaped with a shaking up. Enzor Bowness was discharged from hospital soon after admittance and Sobey is still in the hospital but has apparently suffered only minor injuries. He is complaining of a sore left shoulder.
