THE LIABILITY OF DOCTORS.

Are Medical Men Responsible for the Result of a Wrong Diagnosis?
A London dispatch says: The question of the liability of doctors for the result of their unskillful or negligent treatment of patients is again before the law courts in this country. The children of Samuel Dew, a lawyer in Bangor, fell mysteriously ill of a disease which Dr. Edwards, the family physician, diagnosed as malignant sore throat. The six year old boy died within a few days, and the six months old baby died later, according to Dr. Edwards, of laryngitis coupled with tracheitis. Meantime, as the disease, whatever it might be, was not a contagious one, and in fact, repeatedly declared that no danger existed for anybody, and he also did not find the local sanitary authorities. When the anxious father had lost his two children he thought it about time to have some additional advice, and the new doctors instantly and unhesitatingly diagnosed diphtheria as the cause of all the trouble, and there was much consequent burning of bedding and lavish use of disinfectants. But Dr. Edwards stood to his guns and declared, in effect, that all the other local doctors were fools, and he alone was a worthy representative of modern medical science.
The father brought an action for damages, which was tried last week at the Carnarvon Assizes. There was a tremendous array of experts on both sides. Dr. Lennox Brown, perhaps the greatest living authority on throat diseases, was brought from London, and pronounced for diphtheria. The famous bacteriologist who had analysed a portion of one little victim's membrane found diphtheritic microbes flourishing in it, and was prepared to produce them in court. But other experts were produced on the other side, the lay mind became perplexed, and, the trial ended, unexpectedly, in a judgment for the defendant.

REPLY TO MACK.
