TELEGRAPHIC reports from Manitoba and North West show that the harvest will begin this week and be over by the 25th. The surplus will be over six and a half million of wheat and the quality is splendid. This will give about twelve thousand carloads for conveyance to the sea.

RIENZI, a famous Ottawa horse, which has been making a remarkable record at races in the Eastern States, was killed in a steep chase race, by falling at a brush fence and breaking his neck. The news has created consternation in sporting circles.

FRANK TILLEY sails for Canada by the Parson on the 16th instant. The Montreal Gazette learns that his trip abroad has completely restored his health, and that he will be in excellent vigor to undergo the work of the season. He has latterly visited Scotland and the Isle of Wight.

THE surveying steamer Gulnare, Captain McLeod, with Captain Maxwell and staff, arrived this morning from the Newfoundland coast, and will sail on return on Thursday. The captain reports a barkentine off Cape George, and two barks of Cape North, bound for the Island. They report the weather on the coast as "thick and light."

SCOTT ACT CONVICTION.—At Mount Stewart, on the 16th instant, before James Ross and W. J. Logan, Esqrs., Justices of the Peace for Queen's County, John Fisher, of Mount Stewart, at the suit of Thomas Douglass, was convicted and fined fifty dollars and costs, or two months' imprisonment, for a violation of Canada Temperance Act, 1878.

DAVID MORRIS & Co., the great cotton house of the Dominion, which suspended nine months ago with nearly \$1,000,000 of liabilities, and which obtained an extension of three, six, nine and twelve months, have paid up their instalments, with interest, making eighty cents on the dollar, and have been forgiven the balance by the banks of Montreal and merchants, as well as other creditors.
