Mother Of Montague Lady Passes Away In Saskatchewan

A telegram from Mrs. A. D. MacKenzie, Montague, who recently left to visit her aged mother, tells the disappointing news that three hours after she arrived at home, at Lanark Place, Albert, Sask., for the long looked for visit her mother passed away, from a heart attack.

Mrs. W. R. Motherwell held for many years a large place in the life of Saskatchewan. Born in Cape Breton, in her young womanhood she joined the army of public school teachers in Saskatchewan. Later she passed on to the special field of education offered to her in a residential Indian school. Here she gripped in a unique way the life of the Canadian Indian, so that after her marriage she continued as their friend and counsellor in matters relating to education, church, and farming on the reserve.

She was a fine help mate to her husband in his varied political activities, including his work as Minister of Agriculture both in the provincial area and the federal field, but none of these so gripped her life as her work with the Indians. By her expressed desire, she will be carried to the grave by friends from the Indian reserve at Pile Hills, Sask.

Ship Sails With Pulp Wood Cargo

The M.V. "Guy Bartholomew" cleared port at Montague last evening for Chandler, Quebec. Leaving on the high tide, the ship was piloted to Georgetown by Mr. Temple Godel, harbour pilot.

A former L.S.T., the boat is 330 feet long, the largest ship to make port at Montague, which in olden days had many three masted clearing this port for distant ports. But despite their size, none even approached the overall length of the Guy Bartholomew.

Mr. Andy Anderson of Charlottetown supplied the cargo of 1200 cords of pulp wood from his stock yard in Montague, which not only filled the holds but was also piled high on the main deck. Loading operations ceased about 6 p.m., and approximately one half hour later Captain Duquet gave the order to sail. A large number of people lined the wharf to watch the departure, and to have a last look at the ship which has set the record up to the present for this port.

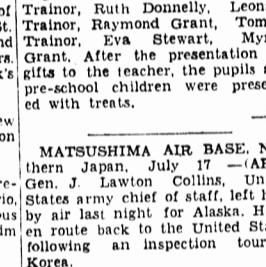

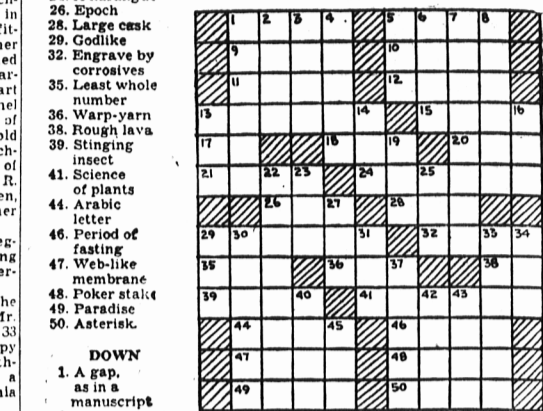
