Urges Maximum Number Of Blood Donors

"Still greater numbers of blood donors are needed in Prince Edward Island," said Dr. W. S. Stanbury, National Commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society who recently concluded an official visit to the Red Cross here.

According to Dr. Stanbury, P. E. I. is only producing about enough donors to meet the local hospital requirements of whole blood. There must be additional supplies secured to provide the plasma used locally and the commitments of the Canadian Red Cross Society to the Dept. of National Defence to supply the blood required for the armed services overseas and for the civilian defence stockpile.

He urged the Provincial Blood Donor Committee to lead no stone unturned to enlist more donors for the clinic at the town of Kamloops, B. C., which produced 3,000 donors at a recent clinic as the result of high press organization and publicity carried out in conjunction with the Kamloops Board of Trade.

While Dr. Stanbury was in Charlottetown he sat in on a meeting of the nucleus Committee for Red Cross Disaster Services, which was headed by Major Lawson Jenkins. Plans were made at this meeting for a gathering of representatives from the different centres in the Province for the formation of a strong Red Cross Disaster Services Committee.
