S' side's Objective For Blood Donor Clinic

SUMMERSIDE — The two-day Summerside Red Cross blood donor clinic exceeded the objective by 12 it was revealed last night by the chairman, Creelman MacArthur.

The objective was 540 and a total of 525 donors gave blood at the four clinics supervised by the Red Cross and held in the Royal Canadian Legion Home.

A total of 253 donors attended Tuesday's clinics while 299 gave blood yesterday afternoon and evening.

In the inter-service club competition the Jaycees retained their place when 46 per cent of the membership became donors; the Provincial Bank won their competition having 100 per cent attendance; Amalgamated Dairies led the business firms with 46 per cent while in the inter-parish competition, Mechanics again came out on top with 26 per cent.

The results revealed there were 105 donors from the parishes which was approximately 20 per cent of the total number of donors, and commended them on this special effort.

The Church of Christ Young Adult group captured its competition with 58 per cent of its membership showing up to give blood, and the Royal Canadian Legion won top spot in the armed forces contest. They had 17 per cent attendance.

The civil servants retained their place with 37 per cent.

Mr. MacArthur said it was a very good response for which he was grateful and thanked all the donors, the Red Cross clinic nurses, members of the local Red Cross who were doing the successful and all who helped in the various ways.

A Red Cross Clinic is slated this morning at the drill hall in the RCAF Station, Summerside and this evening the donors will conclude with a blood donor clinic at the Kensington Legion Home.

Mr. Arsenault, who is a partner in the firm of E. O. Binson's bakery served as vice-president during the past year.

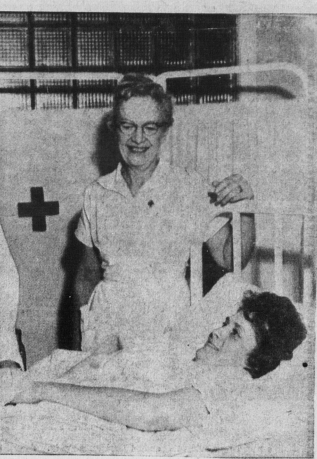
Dr. Hillard Clark will be the new vice-president by acclamation.

Crown Completes Case On Rape Charge At S' side

SUMMERSIDE — The Crown completed its case in Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday in the rape case against Leonard Joseph Noonan and Donald Joseph Noonan, Borden, and Edson Demerall McKenna, A. L. Campbell presided. Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan is conducting the case for the Crown. Defence counsel is J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C. Cpl. Roderick MacKenzie, head of the identification section RCMP headquarters, Charlottetown, was the first witness to take the stand yesterday.

Cpl. MacKenzie related how he drove the small car, allegedly used by the three accused, from Albany to the Borden barracks of the RCMP on the evening of July 22 and was present when Cst. Allan Burchill arranged to have the clothes removed from the accused trio. He said he was also present when the accused were interviewed.

The following morning he examined the vehicle, he testified, and also drove back to Albany and in company with other police officers searched the area where the rape was alleged to have taken place. This he said was near the Albany woods on Cape Travers road, west from the Trans Canada highway. Cpl. MacKenzie stated he also took photographs, and measurements and drew sketches of the area.

FOUND ASLEEP — Cst. Allan Burchill of the Borden detachment testified he found Donald Noonan in a neighbor's home asleep and apparently under the influence of alcohol. This was about 9:50 p.m., July 22. Cst. Burchill took Noonan to the Borden detachment barracks. While there Constables Oland and Craine arrived in company with Mrs. Norma Allen, Leonard Noonan and Edson McKenna.

Cst. Burchill stated Leonard Noonan was picked up about 10:30 on the Trans-Canada Highway at Albany. He had no shoes on and staggered slightly. There was a smell of alcohol from his breath, he said. He and Cst. Oland took the clothes from all three men and dressed them in some of their own.

Cst. Burchill took Mrs. Allen to the office of Dr. Bonnell in Bedouque and following that, took her to the home of Mrs. David Mullins in Borden, where she removed her clothes and dressed in others. Cst. Burchill took these clothes back to the Borden detachment.

Third Crown witness called was Cpl. William Macdonald in charge of the Borden detachment. He testified that on the evening of July 22 he took statements from all three accused in the detachment office at Borden. Cst. Oland and Cpl. MacKenzie were present when these statements were given he related.

Cpl. Macdonald said at 2 a.m. July 23 the three accused directed him, Cpl. MacKenzie, Constables Oland, Craine and Brooks in the Albany woods area where the alleged offence occurred. Cst. Oland and Craine were detailed for guard duty that night.

Cpl. Macdonald said the following morning he conducted a search of the area and found several items of clothing and other articles and sent them to the RCMP crime detection laboratory at Sackville.

EXAMINED CLOTHING — Cpl. William Robertson, clinician at the crime lab in Sackville testified that he had received several items of clothing and other materials from Cpl. Macdonald in Borden and he had examined them and found human blood on several items of clothing.

First defence witness called was Philip G. Howat, Borden. He testified that about 4:30 p.m., July 22, he was on the Borden shore when the three accused drove down. About half an hour later, he was at the home of Mr. Lajoie in Borden and the three accused drove in the yard. They all got out of the car and asked for liquor but got none.

School Buses Scheduled For Safety Inspection

In conjunction with national Safe Driving Week, Dec. 1 to Dec. 7, school buses from all 14 of the province's regional high schools will travel to Charlottetown Saturday morning where they will line up for safety inspection at 11 a.m. at Victoria Park.

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said yesterday that 61 buses will be involved. From their different centres they will travel in convoy to Charlottetown, escorted by members of the RCMP.

It is expected that the chairman of all regional high school boards will attend the inspection. RCMP traffic officers are to check the buses, testing such safety equipment as lights, brakes and horns.

Department of education officials, as well as Premier Walter R. Shaw, are expected to be on hand.

Following the inspection, which will take about two hours, the department of education is tender a dinner at Montgomery Hall for the bus drivers.

Jap Oranges Arrive At Vancouver

VANCOUVER — Distribution of millions of boxes of Mandarin oranges across Canada commenced with arrival here Tuesday of the year's first shipment of the fruit from Japan.

Ten ships will berth at this port with cargoes of the sweet, juicy seedless and easy-peeled delicacies. They are becoming increasingly popular as Christmas treats in Canada. Canadian National Railways is assisting in the distribution of these Mandarins to Canadian homes as far east as Halifax.

Dozens of refrigerators can speed them east on fast freights daily into December to meet the demand.

As many as 20,000 Mandarins may be contained in each refrigerator car. It is estimated some 30,000,000 "Mikans" the Japanese word for Mandarin oranges, will be carried in CN cars to various parts of Canada this year.
