

MEETING AT LOT 65.

The large hall at Lot 65 was packed on Saturday night to hear the public questions of the day discussed by the Liberal Conservative candidates and other speakers. Mr. D. W. Henderson occupied the chair, and the speaking took place in the following order:

Mr. W. S. Stewart, in an hour's speech, gave a thorough and comprehensive review of the misdeeds and shortcomings of the present Government and the policy of imperial preferential trade which Sir Charles Tupper is about to accomplish for Canada. He was well received and loudly applauded on concluding.

Premier Farquharson spoke after Mr Stewart, speaking chiefly on local questions, not attempting to meet the charges made against the Ottawa Government by the previous speaker.

Mr. P. J. Trainor was the next speaker, and took the meeting by storm by his able and eloquent speech.

Mr. Trainor was followed by Dr. Douglass, who seemed to be all at sea on Dominion politics.

After Dr. Douglass had concluded his remarks the chairman spoke about its adjourning the meeting on account of its being Saturday evening. While the matter of adjournment was being considered Mr. J. F. Wear, who was not called for by any one, ascended the platform to speak.

Mr. Stewart objected to this, declaring that it was the turn of a Liberal-Conservative speaker. Mr. James McLean, of West River, and Mr. Stewart arranged that the latter should make a short reply to Dr. Douglass, and that then Mr. McLean should speak on behalf of the Government. But Mr. Wear and Premier Farquharson would not consent, insisting that Mr. Wear should speak first, and in consequence the meeting broke up in confusion.

SATURDAY'S FOOTBALL GAME.

Sons of the Heather Victorious.

The second football match of the season was played at Victoria Park Saturday afternoon, when a Scotch team lined up against the allied forces of England, Ireland, etc. The day was one that would delight a footballist's heart. There was not a breath of wind; the grounds were in excellent order, and conditions were favourable for a good game. The Highlanders won the toss and played the first half with the sun behind them. It was 4:30 when Blake kicked off for the Allcomers. It was soon apparent that the Highland laddies were to have the better of the argument. Their back division was impregnable, while their forwards fought every inch of ground. Not many minutes of play had elapsed when Ritchie was given the ball on his own fifteen yard line by a magnificent run he eluded his opponents' backs, and the first "try" was scored for the Scotchmen. The goal was not kicked and the score stood Scotchmen 3; Allcomers 0. The Allcomers now made desperate efforts to score, McQuillan, Kehoe and the two Sullivans doing splendid work. But the Scottish back division kept up their good performances and by some tacking, swift running and skilful handling of the ball kept the score down. Their forwards rushed the pigskin down the field, and R. B. Brown went over the line for another try. Bethune kicked a pretty goal and the score stood Scotchmen 8; Allcomers 0. Thus the half ended.

The second half was more stubbornly contested, and the allcomers did better work. But the Scotchmen were not to be outdone and after some magnificent "passing" on the half-back line Ritchie again made one of his sensational runs and another try was the result. No goal. Scotchmen 11; Allcomers 0.

The Highlanders' forward had apparently used their strength and it required skilful work on the part of the quarters—Lou Macmillan and Brown—to stave off the onslaught of the Allcomers. The ball was rushed to the Scottish five yard mark and a try was in sight. A series of scrimmages followed during which a Highlander transgressed the rules by picking the ball out. The referee was too sharp for him, however, and the Allcomers were awarded a free kick which resulted in a goal by Blake. Score—Scotch 11; Allcomers 2. The scene of conflict was then changed to the other end of the field. Ritchie again went over the line for a touchdown. The score stood Scotchmen 14; Allcomers 2—and the game ended.

The combination work of the Scotch halfbacks—Ritchie, Eric McLean, Bethune and C. McMillan—was of the ground gaining style, and a marked improvement was noticeable from last week's game. Keep it up boys, it is the only way to win. The quarters, Lou Macmillan and Brown, as usual were always "in the game," while on the Allcomers' team McQuillan, Kehoe, Trainor and the Sullivans played with excellent judgment and repeatedly gained ground. The Prince of Wales College men on the team, McLean, Strong, McBride, Stiers, McFadyen, Seiler and the Sharps are rapidly coming forward and will doubtless improve greatly with more practice.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon, of the Abegweit, refereed the game to the satisfaction of all.
