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LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FIRE AT GRAND TRACADIE—The new schoolhouse at Grand Tracadie was burned to the ground this morning between 2 and 3 o'clock. The cause is unknown. There was no insurance.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.—Two horses were killed by lightning at St. Mary's, Kent county, on Friday morning last during the severe electrical storm which passed over this section.—Moncton Times.

ISLAND STEAMERS.—The Princess returned to Charlottetown last evening, and this morning the Northumberland took her old place on the Summerside-Point Du Chene route.

DOG TAX.—A number of summonses have been ordered to issue against parties who have neglected to pay their dog tax. Owners of canines who have not yet paid taxes should do so at once in order to save expenses.

ACTION FOR WAGES.—Before F. L. Haszard, Stipendiary Magistrate, yesterday, Captain John Jummo appeared in answer to a summons issued against him by Thomas Whittle for the non-payment of wages earned on board the schooner Leandra. The amount claimed was \$67.15, for which sum judgment was given. Mr. Ravenbury appeared for the plaintiff, and M. Stewart, Q. C., for the owner of the vessel.

MISSIONARY MEETING.—The Misses McCully held a missionary meeting in the lecture-room of Zion Church yesterday afternoon, which was well attended notwithstanding the disagreeable weather. Miss McCully spoke of the spiritual needs of China and of the obligations of Christians, as trustees of the Gospel, to send it to heathen lands. Her sister treated the audience to two missionary solos, playing the accompaniment herself on the auto-harp. Rev. D. Sutherland presided.

FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—The meeting in the schoolroom of the First Methodist Church last evening was well attended and proved most interesting and instructive. 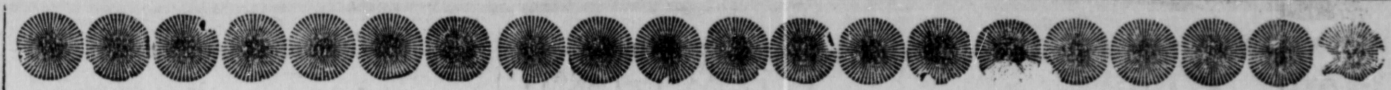

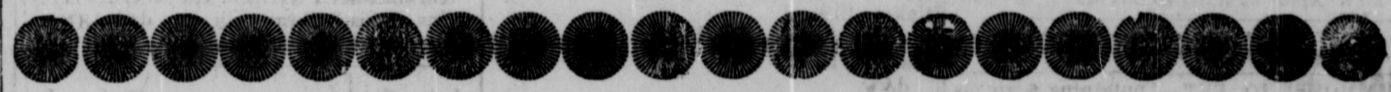
