FILLING FLOOR CRACKS. Cracks in floors, while being unsightly in appearance, harbor an unbelievable quantity of dirt. A new floor, if properly laid, is free from this disagreeable feature, but in the course of time, these cracks will begin to appear due to the shrinkage of the wood. If the floor cracks are filled with "crack filler" the accumulation of dust and dirt will not be in evidence. Thus you may be assured of a sanitary floor surface and sickness may be avoided. It is a simple matter to remedy: just clean out the dust and dirt from the cracks with some sharp pointed instrument and then thoroughly clean out with a scrubbing brush, soap and water. When dry, the crack filler may be applied. It is made in stiff putty knife in much the same manner and should be applied with a putty knife. To make the job complete the floor should then be waxed, varnished and painted, depending, of course, on the present finish and the effect desired.

The budget debate has taken a new lease of life from the Crerar amendment. Instead of being lullinated last week, as was confidently predicted ten days ago, the outlook now is that it may extend through the present week. A score of Progressive members have yet to speak, we are told in Ottawa dispatches. The Progressive members, most of whom are new to the Federal arena, are not wanting in eloquence and their attitude toward the King Government requires much explanation in order to satisfy their constituents. Obviously they do not wish to defeat the King government.

Had they wished to do so, the Crerar amendment would not have been framed as it is, to make it impossible for the official Conservative opposition to vote for it. The Crerar amendment is, on its face, a condemnation of the government for having violated its pledges and for having endorsed the protective policy. Morally it condemns the government. Strategically it saves the government from the possibility of present defeat. There is nothing in it that excludes a secret understanding between Liberals and Progressives for mutual support in time of need. Premier King may have quite willingly given his friend Mr. Crerar his free consent to move an amendment which threatens no danger for the present moment.

The net result of the discussion will, however, be both morally and politically damaging the government. The Progressives are losing ground as a party by continuing to lend material support to a Government whose fiscal policy and moral conduct they condemn by their proposed amendment. On the other hand protection, which is the core of the Conservative policy, has gained by the new endorsement, which Mr. Fielding has given it in his budget.

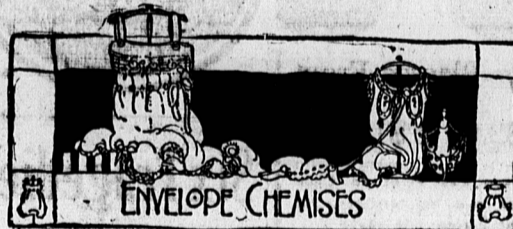

HOW COFFEE IS GROWN.

Coffee is generally spoken of as a berry or bean, but that part of the coffee tree that we use really is the seed. The tree grows naturally to a height of from twenty to thirty feet, but the natural growth is checked by the growers, who keep the trees as low as five feet. The cutting does injure the tree and it is far more convenient to gather the fruit.

The coffee tree begins to bear when it is about three years old, the singular fact about it being often noticeable that the fresh blossoms and the ripened fruit will appear on the same tree at the same time. The fruit of the coffee tree is round and red and looks like our cherries, and, being sweet to the taste, is eaten by the natives as we eat cherries. Each berry contains two seeds—the beans with

which we are familiar—enclosed in a skin, with their flat sides together. The meat of the fruit is valueless, so when the fruit is gathered it is dried so the seeds may be easily removed. How coffee came first to be used as a drink is not known but it has been so used for at least a thousand years in Persia. It was introduced in Europe about three hundred years ago.
