At the close of church services an address was read to Rev. V. Floyd McLaughlin and a presentation was made by Leigh Gillis on behalf of the parishioners. Father McLaughlin is leaving after six years here.

The parade of floats led by Lads and Lassies and under command of Earl MacDonald of the Tignish Legion and their veterans, a child's doll carriage parade, bicycle parade and an old fashioned picnic and sky diving saw hundreds of people turn out for a day of celebrations.

A sod turning ceremony for the Tignish Centennial Sports Arena and the official opening of centennial day celebrations was carried out by the Hon. Henry W. Wedge, minister of welfare and labor.

Russell J. Perry, chairman of village commissioners was master of ceremonies for the day. In welcoming Mr. Wedge he gave a brief outline of the work of the Tignish Sports Recreation Association since first formation in 1963.

Clark Elected In '27 Not '32'

Russell C. Clark of Mt. Stewart who died in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Wednesday, was first elected to the Provincial Legislature in 1927, and was defeated once, in 1931, by Matthew Wood, Cross Roads. Yesterday's story quoted a Parliamentary Guide statement that Mr. Clark was first elected in 1922, which was incorrect. He was a sworn in member without portfolio in the Walter M. Lea Government on September 30, 1930 and served in the cabinet until the government was defeated in August 1931.
