"Very little, if any, of the hard pressed cheddar cheese made in this Province from unpasteurized milk is sold to the consumers without being ripened according to regulations laid down by the Federal Department of Health and Welfare, stated Mr. Henry J. MacDonald, Dairy Superintendent, Provincial Department of Agriculture.

Mr. MacDonald was commenting on a recent Ottawa despatch which stated that new regulations had been placed on the Canadian cheese manufacturers as a result of a survey made by the Federal Health and Welfare Department, revealing a positive staphylococcus hazard in soft cheese made from unpasteurized milk.

Farquhar, (above) Maritime Special Representative to the Canadian International Trade Fair, told members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade at their monthly dinner meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel here last night.

Mr. J. Gordon MacDonald, President of the Board presided and guests present included: Mr. W. E. Agnew, Director of Trade for the Province; Mr. Ignatius MacDonald, President of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and Mr. L. Noonan, President of the P. E. I. Fisheries Federation.

In an informative address Mr. Farquhar told the members of the Board that the 6th Canadian International Trade Fair would be opening in Toronto on June 1st. He noted that last year over 60 foreign countries were represented along with every Province in Canada with the exception of Prince Edward Island.

Huge Inaugural Parade From Capitol Hill To White House

By Roger D. Greene WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 - (AP) - In wild screaming rebel yells and cowboy whoops and hollers, they rolled it out along the dense-packed parade route from Capitol Hill to the White House.

"Yeeee-a-a-ay, Ike!" That was the keynote sound for the hours-long inaugural parade which Dwight D. Eisenhower led down Pennsylvania Avenue, then reviewed from a stand in front of his new White House home.

The pageant itself was an extravaganza form a slice right out of the complexities that make up of the United States—bathing beauties; the doves that represent aspirations for peace; lethal arms for protection against peace-breakers; and a whole train of floats depicting events in the life of Eisenhower.

Riding in a gleaming white open car beside his wife, the 62-year-old President stood bareheaded most of the two-mile parade route as he flashed his famous grin and waved first one hand and then the other to the massed throngs.

Call For Greater N. S. Industrial Development HALIFAX, Jan. 20 - (CP) - The Nova Scotia Federation of Labor today urged greater industrial development in the Province with emphasis on the steel and coal industries.

The Federation called for expansion of present basic industries along with establishment of new projects, and claimed the Provincial Department of Trade and Industry "has not brought about any real improvement as far as new industries are concerned . . . apart from the tourist industry, no development is taking place."

The organization made the points in a wide-ranging brief presented to the Provincial Cabinet.

The brief asked the Government to take the lead in greater fabrication of steel products and join with labor in demanding that the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation expand the basic steel industry to a greater degree.

Development of Sydney, Halifax, Trenton and Amherst into centres of steel production was "an essential need."

"Because of a continuing shortage of steel plate, the brief urged the appointment of a procurement agency to obtain material needed by shipyards working on government contracts.

It sought continued research to develop new uses for coal and asked for representations to Federal authorities urging appointment of a labor representative on the Dominion Coal Board.

Turning to the controversial teachers' salary issue which last year led to a strike in Cape Breton, the Federation's brief asked legislation providing arbitration and conciliation boards to deal with salary disputes between school boards and teachers.

It recommended immediate action to ensure "an adequate salary increase" for provincial teachers, along with a licensing board with representation from the Nova Scotia Teachers' Union.

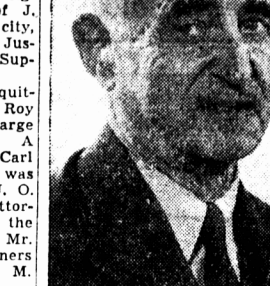
