British Red Cross To Assist Russia

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Oct. 5.—It is said the British Government has decided to transfer to the British Red Cross for famine relief distribution in Russia, certain surplus war stores consisting in part of medicines and clothing. These stores valued at approximately £250,000 are now being held at the disposal of the Red Cross Board. The action was taken on the recommendation of the International Commission on Russian Relief which met at Paris in September.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—Parliament was officially dissolved tonight and simultaneously the following powerful appeal to the Canadian people was issued from the pen of the Prime Minister:

To The People of Canada: Parliament has been dissolved. The people of Canada, its men, and its women, are called upon to determine, in what will inevitably be a contest of reaching and momentous in its consequences, what shall be, through the strenuous journey that very plain is ahead of us, the character and direction of our policy.

A Protective Tariff.

"Honest Jack" Premier Of N.S.W. Deap

(Special to The Guardian.) SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct. 5.—John Storey who in April, 1920, became premier of New South Wales died today. Formerly a bolshie labor leader in Australia and was known as "Honest Jack". He came into office following a campaign waged with the utmost bitterness and during campaign speeches he declared to impose a larger share of the public burden on unproductive capital, speculators and absentees in the country while the producers' share in the burden would be lightened.

Railway Commission Had Stormy Session
