## IN MEMORIAM

**JOHN GARLAND**

A highly esteemed citizen of Auburn passed peacefully to his eternal reward in the person of John Garland. He succumbed to the weight of the years that bore heavily upon him and on September 4th, he closed his eyes in death, a life well lived had come to an end.

Mr. Garland was born at Fort Augustus in the year 1877, the eldest son of the late Joseph Garland and Margaret Berrigan. When he felt mature enough to face the world and make his own way in life he went to Lowell, Mass., where he became employed and married Margaret Trainor, of Johnston's River, P.E.I. and set about to make his home there.

A yearning for the soil of his native province was stronger than any of the monetary emoluments or attractions of his adopted land so in the year 1919 he returned to Ft. Augustus with his wife and two daughters, and took up farming in the adjoining district of Auburn, where he proved to be one of the most successful and tidest farmers in this part of the province.

All his time and energy was not directed towards his own interests, he was a community spirited and neighbourly man, always willing to help in time of need and enthusiastic towards any Community enterprise, in politics he was staunch Conservative.

His last days in this life he reaped the rewards of a good Christian by being frequently visited by Rev. Father Butler, P.P. and consoled by the sacraments of the Church and on the morning of his death he received the last sad rites from the hands of his pastor with Rev. W.O. Simpson in attendance.

There are left to mourn, two daughters, (Mary), Mrs. James McCaughey, (Ella), Mrs. William McMillan, Lowell, Mass.

Mrs. McMillan travelled to the bedside of her father during the summer, to comfort him and assist in his care and returned to attend his funeral.

There are also left to mourn two sisters, (Annie), Mrs. Foster and (Mary), Mrs. John McCarron and 3 brothers, Arthur, Boston, Mass., and Peter and Leo, Ft. Augustus, also eight grandchildren, his above-mentioned wife predeceased him six years ago.

His very largely attended funeral was held at St. Patrick's Church Ft. Augustus on Monday morning where solemn high mass was celebrated by his pastor, Rev. L.P. Butler and Rev. Vincent Murnaghan, deacon and Rev. William Simpson, sub-deacon.

## business; (2) use of labor or output per man; (3) use of capital or turnover an investment; (4) crop yields per acre; (5) livestock yield per animal; (6) enterprise combination or lines of production.

acreage is the usual measure of size of business, and where acreage is small, the breaking, renting or buying more land can overcome this. But where this is not possible, perhaps your cropping program could be revised to enable more animals to be carried on pasture, together with a more intensive hay and grain crop.

Some farm operators claim that they just are getting paid for their labor. Some operators work long hours and accomplish little productive work, while on the other hand, others work average hours and accomplish much. Job planning, chore routines, field arrangements, etc., play an important part in use of labor. Labor efficiency can be increased by carrying bigger enterprises through a more specialized or bigger operation. This would then justify the purchase of labor saving equipment.

If the year's gross farm production is high in relation to total farm investment capital is being used effectively. Weak relationship between value of production and investment may exist due to crop and livestock yields, over-investment in land, buildings or machinery. These conditions may exist for the farm as a whole or just one enterprise.

Low yields in crops and livestock may be due to many different causes. To take crops, for example, poor yields may be due to rotation, seed, fertilizer, or cultural practices. Soil test will determine if the land is suitable enough for the crop to be grown on it. Livestock yields may be due to weak husbandry techniques. A low milk producer can be easily replaced, but why not breed her to a beef bull in order to obtain a beef animal of satisfactory type. The use of artificial insemination can build up the quality of your stock and enrolling under Dairy Herd Improvement Association will tell you just how your dairy herd stands.

Combination of enterprises should be picked to get the best available farm resources and also to enable farm labor to be productively employed year round. Dairy cattle and hogs is a combination that works very well. The use of manure on a vegetable crop is, in some cases, a valuable way of selling manure.

It is not always the good land or large acreage that puts the farmer into higher income groups. Rather, it is the farmers who have a favorable balance between, and give equal importance to these "big six" factors. Studies in Alberta have shown that farmers who were at least average or better in these six factors made more than those farmers who were below average for the district
