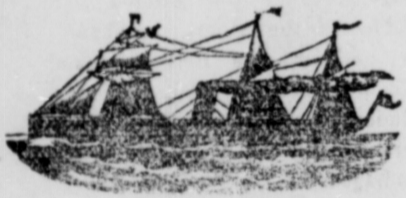

BLACK DIAMOND LINE

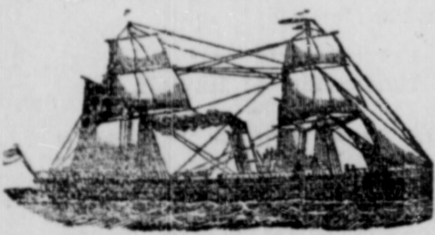

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Ottawa Journal: In return for their bill for \$22,540, for conducting the enquiry into the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, the commissioners recommend the dismissal of twelve of the officers. The commissioners seem to have made a good job of it, but as with most jobs, the first cost comes high.

Boston Herald: We have been accustomed to speak so frequently of the French and Russians as our true friends, and to think of the English as our trade rivals, and hence our enemies, that in a crisis such as the country is now in, we find it hard to realize that our traditional friends have proved thoroughly false to us, and that our cousins, with whom we have so often been in contentions, finding that the world was against us, backed up our cause by absolutely preventing any foreign interference with us.

New England Homestead: It is a war for humanity that the United States wages. History affords no instance of higher moral purpose in a war. The Spanish evacuation of Cuba will be the highest possible satisfaction for the dastardly destruction of the Maine. It is not a war of conquest. The United States has no desire to annex Cuba. The American people will not permit it. Besides the weighty moral reasons against annexation, is the added one that the free admission of Cuban sugar and tobacco would lose up every sugar mill and cigar factory in the United States, and rob the American farmer of his hand-earned home market for sugar and tobacco. The agrarian element of the whole United States would oppose annexation on both patriotic and selfish grounds. A powerful coterie of capitalists, realizing the millions upon millions they scoop if allowed to exploit Cuba for this market, are secretly at work to convert a holy war into a conquest for their benefit. Their scheme will fail. The United States' duty will be finished when the Cubans have established peace and an independent government.

London Outlook: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier is face to face with a most interesting situation in the revolt of the Canadian Senate against the new Yukon Railway charter. One idea remains, and this the Canadian ministry may adopt if the Senators remain obdurate. It is, in plain English, to pay off enough of the grave and reverend seigniors among the Senators into retirement with pensions—a small sum would do it—and fill up the gaps with those who would give the Senate something of the political complexion of the Canadian House of Commons, and therefore of public opinion at the present moment." This is a brilliant conception. As the Senators already enjoy \$1,000 a year sessional indemnity, it would not be exactly "a small sum" that would pension them into retirement even if it were only money they wanted.

The steamship Andrew Carnegie, of Chicago, brought 230,000 bushels of corn to Owen Sound, Ont. This is said to be the largest cargo of corn ever floated on fresh water.

MASTERLY DISCOURSE.—A correspondent at Pownal writes: On Sunday evening, May 1st, the Rev. Mr. Howson preached an eloquent and masterly discourse from the 10th chapter of Daniel. The sermon was a most exhaustive description of the force of habit. The preacher earnestly advised all, but especially young people, to form correct habits in every relation of life, and when they were old they would not depart from it. LONDON, May 4.—A special despatch from Madrid, via Bayonne says: "In the mob on Monday night were many officers in mufti who were foremost in inciting the people to attack the ministers' residences and were loudest in calling for cheers for Weyler."

There is no doubt these men desired to provoke the government to fire upon the mob and so to pave the way for its downfall. Some of them were arrested but were subsequently released, the government fearing to let it become known that officers of the army formed a part of the mob.

While the streets were thus occupied great unrest was manifested at the various barracks and the soldiers were only prevented from joining the mob by the personal pleadings of their officers. The republicans were even more busy than the officers in egging on the crowd, shouting "Down with the Queen Regent."

More than once they led the mob towards the royal palace but each time the police drove them back.

LONDON, May 4.—At noon yesterday the proclamation of martial law in Madrid caused much dissatisfaction; it being declared unnecessary unless the Government had information of a secret conspiracy.

Sunday's demonstration by the people was a trivial matter even compared with the trifling disturbances which occurred upon the proclamation of the Cuban armistice.

LONDON, May 4.—A later despatch received here today states that the report in circulation at Gibraltar that Senor Moret and Marshal Campos had been assassinated is unfounded.

Enquiries show that the passenger who arrived there from Spain yesterday afternoon brought a rumor that Moret and Campos had been murdered and that Premier Sagasta had sought refuge in the British Embassy at Madrid.

Despatches, however, sent from Madrid last night, reporting speeches of Senor Sagasta and Marshal Campos, seem to show that there is no truth in the report of their assassination.

LISBON, May 4.—News has been received to the effect that the Spanish Cape Verde Squadron has returned to join the Spanish fleet near Cadiz which is ready for sea. The combined fleet will shortly start for American waters.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The Secretary of the Navy has made application for an emergency appropriation of \$2,500,000 for the use of the Bureau of Yards and Docks. This is in addition to the \$18,420,000 asked for yesterday.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—China issued her neutrality proclamation yesterday, so there is now no place left on the Asiatic coast open to the free use of the war vessels of either Spain or the United States.

This is a remarkable departure in view of the fact that China has never before issued a neutrality proclamation.

FOR THE YUKON.—We learn from the Frederickton Globe that the contingents from the Military School there who volunteered their services for duty in the Yukon district for at least two years left on Monday afternoon last en route for Ottawa to join the contingents from the other schools. The whole force will consist of 200 non-commissioned officers and men. The Frederickton school supplies 32. The Island will be represented by J. O. Russell, R. C. A. Harry Holbrook, Toronto School, Harry Wakefield, Frederickton. They are to go by the Sticks route. We wish them bon voyage and safe return.

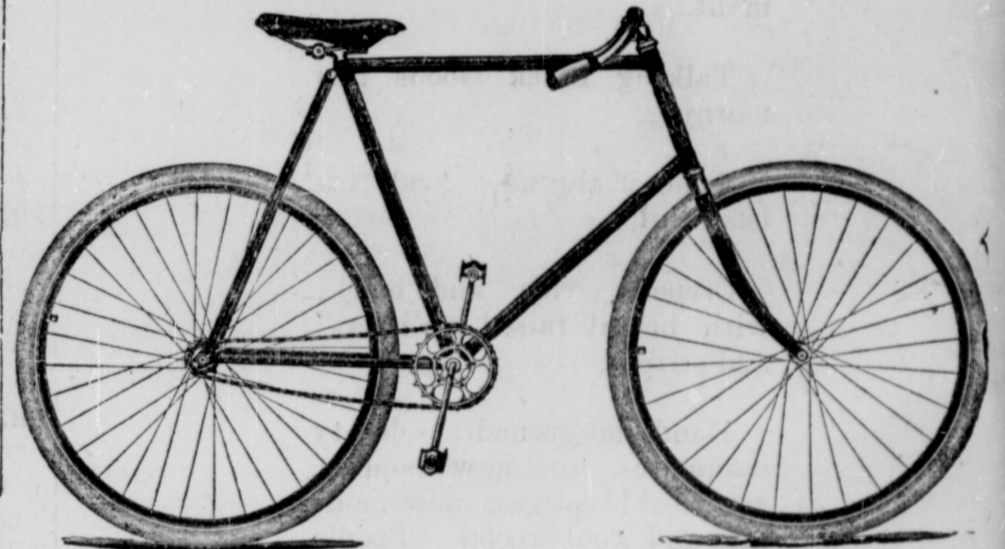

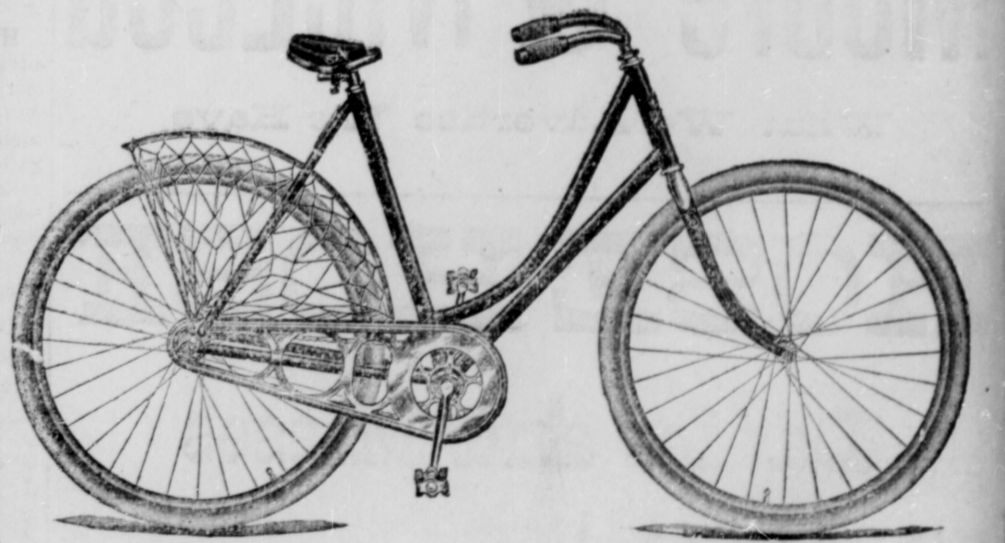
