A 1957 two-tone Ford Fairlane driven by Montreal salesman, J. B. Zogbi, yesterday afternoon was destroyed in a fire that broke out on the Montague highway in the vicinity of Millview. The three motorists then attempted to dampen the flame by throwing snow on the burning area, but to little avail. A local clergyman who happened along, went to his nearby church and brought a fire extinguisher to the scene, but efforts to bring it into operation proved fruitless.

Two other motorists, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Reynolds, former Islanders now visiting at Murray River, spotted the outbreak as their vehicle moved past the Montreal car. Honking their horns, they succeeded in attract-
