

Anniversary Items

TUESDAY, Dec. 2—This day is memorable as witnessing one of those changes of government by force as occurring in Paris. The coup d'état of Louis Napoleon, anno 1857, dissolved the Assembly; arrested 180 deputies; re-established universal suffrage, and placed Paris in a state of siege. The 2nd of December, 1852, after the plebiscite of 21-22 November, found Paris proclaiming Napoleon III, Emperor of France. It is not a little singular that on Dec. 2, (anno 1805) Napoleon I. defeated the Austrians at Austerlitz, having been crowned by the Pope Dec 2 the year previously. Adelaide, Queen-Consort of William IV. of England, died on 2nd Dec. 1849. She was born 1792; married 1818; became Queen 1830; and widow, as the dowager Queen Adelaide, anno 1837.

PRINCE EDWARD SNOWSHOE CLUB.—The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Snowshoe club, will be held on Thursday next, the 4th day of December, at the hour of 7.30 p. m., at Mr. R. R. Fitzgerald's office. All members are requested to attend.
THE Agricultural Convention of Prince County met in Summerside on Friday last, and discussed the questions of Fire Insurance and County Exhibitions. As to the latter, the Pioneer reports that "the opinions expressed were condemnatory of the present arrangement, while some considered that one yearly exhibition for the whole Province would suffice."

MR. A. E. MORRISON has invented a system of fire alarm for this city, which is well suited to its circumstances. Under it, telegraph wires will connect the various sections of the city with the police station, where there will be an annunciator to register the alarms which may come from the different sections. The scheme includes the ringing of the fire-bell from the police station, by means of a semaphore apparatus. We hope the proposed system will receive the favorable attention of our good City Fathers. Mr. Morrison says the improvement will cost \$300 or less.
THE Halifax Evening Mail of Saturday has the following:—"Among the pleasing social events which will take place in the early part of the coming winter will be the marriage of the popular, enthusiastic and devoted young Pastor of a north-end Episcopal Church to a Maitland lady, the daughter of a late member of the Local Government." We strongly suspect that the "young pastor" is not unknown in our own midst, and was for a long period connected with a west-end church in this city.

A SPECIAL despatch from Ottawa to the Toronto Globe says: "Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., of Charlottetown, is here to make application to the Supreme Court for leave to appeal on behalf of the Dominion Government from a decision of the Provincial Supreme Court in the P. E. Island Bank case. The Dominion Government contended that their claim against the Bank was privileged, but the Court decided otherwise, and from this judgment leave is asked to appeal." We learn that the necessary permission has been given by the Supreme Court, and that the appeal will be heard in Ottawa in February next.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Arthur's Valedictory.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.
In his valedictory message transmitted to Congress, to-day, President Arthur says: "Our relations with foreign powers continue amicable." He recommends that the indemnity fund, paid by China for losses of Americans in Canton riots, be returned to China. The president suggests that in view of the frequent invitations for the United States to participate in international exhibitions discretionary authority should be given the executive. The expenses of the government for the year, are estimated at \$290,620,000, receipts \$330,000,000, leaving a surplus of about \$39,000,000.

Lost with all Hands.
St. John's, Nfld, Dec. 1.
A melancholy tragedy occurred on the West Coast, near the channel, on Saturday night last. The Mary Joseph, bound from Sydney to the channel, was lost with all the crew and passengers on Tar Point. [The Mary Joseph was owned in St. John's, Nfld. She was a vessel of twenty-eight tons.]

France and China.
HONG KONG, Dec. 1.
The French forces on the 14th ult. attempted to drive the Chinese sharpshooters from a hill near Kelong, and were repulsed with the loss of 20 men killed. It is reported that there is an outbreak of plague among the French soldiers.

Franchise Bill.
LONDON, Dec. 1.
The Franchise Bill will come up for the third reading in the House of Lords on Friday.
In the Commons to-day, Mr. Gladstone presented the Redistribution Bill, the reading of which takes place after the holidays.

Ready to Meet.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 1.
It is rumored that El Mahdi is disposed to enter into negotiations with General Woiseley, meeting him if possible near Khartoum.

Public Executions Abolished in France.
PARIS, Dec. 1.
In the Senate yesterday a bill was passed abolishing public executions.
