Racing Achievements

It would seem that several persons are in for congratulations following Thursday's harness racing at Sydney and Charlottetown.

First we want to again doff our hat to Doug Hill and Joe Hennessy on winning the \$3,000 Doose Pace at the Cape Breton centre. Joe rode Doug's Dominion Boy to easy victories in both dashes of the big feature.

This gives Dominion Boy a five record in the three circuit which he has performed in this season. He was 2-3 in the Evening Week and now 1-4 at Jim Ferris's oval in Cape Breton. And don't forget that Doug's roan broke the track record at Summerside in his first time out.

NEXT we want to give our salute to The Greenbrier Farms of Charlottetown. They decided against sending their free-former, June Boy, to Sydney but they are getting honor of their own very same night in Charlottetown.

His beautiful two-year-old filly was establishing a record for two-year-old fillies as far as Prince Edward Island goes. This filly, named "Reach" MacGregor, teamed Elicio Wick to a new provincial record of 2:12.2, quite a performance for a two-year-old filly in her first time out with this filly, this time in 2:13.

Charlottetown Driving Park, through its race secretary and classifier E. Frank Acker, presented driver MacGregor with a \$50 cheque for his success. The filly is staked in some important races this fall in Upper Canada and local patrons will be watching Myron Bell and Mel Jenkins the very best with this Gene Abbey offspring.

Track Record

FINALLY owners Ramsey and Howard of Albany saw their great tractor, Poplar Flash, turn on the steam at Charlottetown Driving Park.

The seven-year-old gelding never looked better "since coming this way" as he roared to a halfling decision over Janet M. in 2:07.1 in the night's final mile. He equalled the track record set by Fedoran last August and served notice that the said record is very much in jeopardy. Trotters like Poplar Flash, Stormy Song, Avon Worthly and The Shark should make this 2:07 record shiver this summer. Give these high steppers a warm, sunny afternoon in Old Home Week and there's a good chance the CDP management will be handing out a cheque to the driver of the horse holding the new trotting record.

Cyril Smith, a veteran of many great drives, gave one of the best of his career when he reined the Poplar Flash to his great record-riding victory. Our only regret was that Cyril didn't do it in 2:07 flat. It would have been indeed nice to see another 2:07 with his name on that record board across the judges' stand.

Perhaps Cyril will yet lower it before this campaign passes into history.

Honorable Mention

HONORABLE mention surely must go to Dr. MacLure's mare, Jane M.

Jane lowered her mark to 2:06.1 in winning her first outing and looked like a double dash victor with a few yards to go in the second try. This was the time that Poplar Flash stole his tremendous fifth and managed to get by with an eyelash. You can imagine how close Jane was to giving her own record a good thumping.

Walter Downe can take a bow for that performance.

Williamson Breaks Mile Mark

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — University of New Brunswick's Chris Williamson Friday shattered Bruce Kidd's Junior Canadian mile record and led the field in the three-mile event at the opening here of the East-Canadian age class track and field championships.

Williamson made sure of his record when he surged ahead of the pack to hit the wire in the 4:07.3 mile record, a two-year-old record.

Williamson, ranked next to Toronto's Kidd as the best distance runner in the country, threw past his competitors in the three-mile event to finish with a time of 14:30.8. He took the

JOHN PAUL JOINS SWIM

A former long distance runner of note, John Paul, announced last night he was going to enter the Northumberland Strait swim this morning.

The Indian runner who now makes his home at Toronto was hitch-hiking to Borden last night to see about getting a boat. He said this was the first time he ever entered a long-distance swimming race but would not be confident he could swim the nine-mile Strait without too much difficulty.

Paul would be the first to enter the half-way point of his first trip around the Borden Strait swim division. Ron Campbell of Hamilton, on the South-Western Ontario team, is the 100-yard mark from 10.2 to 10.3 seconds. Ron Morrison, from the East York Track Club, topped the Midjet 440-yard time to 51 seconds from 51.8 seconds.

Two distance marks were set in Midjet girls field events. Ingrid, fired the javelin 104 feet. The previous mark was 102 feet, three inches, set by Janet Spry of Quebec.

New Pieces of South-Western Ontario high jumped five feet, bettering the 4'11 1/4 mark of New Brunswick's Sandra Barr. Ed Heame of East York, near Toronto, equalled the 100-yard dash record for the juvenile boys class—9.2 seconds. Les Eves of British Columbia has that time on the books.

Officials today will be watching East York's Morrison in the Midjet 800, where he is expected to finish strong. Similar interest is centred on Roger Campbell in the Midjet 220 yards.

A fairly stiff breeze did little to cool off the 350 odd athletes who competed in temperatures close to 90 degrees at Shamrock Park.

Cathy Chapman of Don Mills, near Toronto, came within one second of the Canadian mark for the 100 yards in Midjet girls competition. She raced through in 11 seconds flat, edging Barbara Jalbert of Quebec, 11.2, and Crystal Olive of St. Croix, 11.3.

In the juvenile men's mile, Ray Tucker, of South-Western Ontario, topped P. J. Best, Armstrong and Dave Kerr, both of Quebec, as he turned the mile in 10:07.5.

Judy Halliday of Ottawa took the juvenile girls 100 yards final in 1:29.8. Ellis of Halifax placed second and Ontario's Olympic star Abigail Hoffman canno have third.

The Ottawa girl nosed out Hoffman in the first heat of the 100 yard event, winning in 1:13. Given Hills qualified by winning the second heat in 1:14.

Quebec's Winstan Ingalls placed third in the juvenile boys high jump, won by P. J. Best, a university of Michigan athlete, holds the Canadian record for the juvenile 220 yard dash—22.1 seconds. John Whistley of Ontario finished third behind Bates.

One of the events attracting much interest today is expected to be the juvenile girls 440. Who, Toronto's Abbie Hoffman will be favored.

Hot, humid weather is forecast here for the second day's play.
