Yesterday forenoon the CNR despatcher reported that the MV Abegweit was tied up at her Borden berth, due to the high winds which were piling the ice in.

By noon the winds had diminished and with the aid of the changing tide, the ice pressure was relieved, and the ferry was able to start her first crossing of the day at 12.25 p.m., carrying the Charlottetown-Moncton train.

For the remainder of her crossing, the despatcher reported that the ferry was able to complete her schedule, and that her times ranged from 90 to 70 minutes, as compared to her normal time of 35 minutes.

The train from the mainland did not arrive in the city until about 1.30 this morning, but it was reported not due to weather but to a breakdown at the landing.

The Abegweit docked with the train at 6.35 last evening, but a broken cable, in the hoist equipment of the loading apron, prevented it from being positioned for unloading.

Repairs to the cable were completed by 10.55 and the train was finally hauled ashore at about 11.30, after all trucks had rolled off.

### Trawlers' Superstructures May Be Built By City Firm

Fisheries Minister Leo Rosier said last night he had no knowledge that a Charlottetown firm has been awarded a contract to build the superstructure for the steel, stern trawlers. He was being questioned on a report published in Summerside.

He said the Fishermen's Loan Board had decided to go ahead with the construction of the 90-foot craft. The board was open for tenders, but that as far as he knew none had been accepted.

The report had stated that Charlottetown Marine Industries would be building the superstructures for some of the equipment. The hulls were to be constructed in Picton by the Ferguson Industries Ltd. No estimate as to the value of the Charlottetown Industries' part of the \$800,000 contract was given.
