

Local and Other Items.

No mails crossing at the Capes to-day. Nowhere can better bargains be had than at R. Young's. An anti-Tobacco Association has been formed in St. John. They had another fatal case of small pox in Dartmouth, N. S., last week. Land League meeting this evening, at 8 o'clock, in St. Patrick's Hall. Robert Young wants a smart, intelligent boy for his shop. Bank of England, on the 9th inst., reduced rate of discount to 4 per cent. James Yeo, Esq., M. P., for Prince County, arrived at Ottawa, on the 9th inst. The Northern Light is still in the ice a short distance outside Georgetown Harbor. The bark George Peake, for Maryport, passed out at Fortress Muro on the 8th inst. Wallace Ross has gone to Portland, to go into training for the coming race with Haulan. Hon. Mr. Gavin and S. F. Perry, Esq., M. P., arrived by train from Tignish yesterday evening. We are pleased to hear that the Ottawa Government have appointed Mrs. W. R. Watson a licensed vendor of Dominion Postage Stamps. Mail train from Halifax, on Thursday, reached Moncton in six hours and twenty minutes, within a fraction of thirty miles an hour. Good work for the season. Sir Alexander Galt has gone to Paris to resume, through Lord Lyons, the British Ambassador there, negotiations for a commercial convention between France and Canada. Redemption of Bill Stamps.—The St. John Sun understands that the inland Revenue Department is arranging for the redemption of bill stamps, of which notice will be given at an early day. Rev. Benjamin Shaw, an English Church Clergyman, residing at the mouth of Jemseg River, has been missing for a week. It is feared he drove into a hole on the river and was drowned. Mr. Hugh Macdonald, barrister, son of Sir John A. Macdonald, will shortly leave Ottawa for Winnipeg, where he intends to take up permanent residence, and practice his profession in partnership with Mr. Stewart Tupper, son of Sir Charles Tupper. All regular trains are running on time to-day, with the exception of the train from Tignish, which will leave that place on arrival of a special, which is clearing the track, and which left Bloomfield at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Scott Act.—Mr. J. J. Maclean, Q. C., of Ottawa, who has been retained by the Dominion Alliance to defend the Canada Temperance Act before the Privy Council, has been called for by the London solicitors, as the case is expected to be reached before the end of the month. The second Manitoba Excursion of the season left Ontario on the 9th. There were seventy-five passengers, and two cars laden with freight; forty passengers, and six cars of freight from Almonte, and thirty passengers and four car loads of freight from Smith's Falls. The brig "Lottie Bell," Capt. Rankin, which left North Sydney for St. John's, Nfld., on the 16th January last, arrived at St. Thomas on the 3rd inst., leaking badly. The barque Ringwood, Trainor master, which left Sydney for St. John's, the same time as the "Lottie Bell," has not yet been heard of. A suit for damages brought by Mr. Cloture of Montreal, against Rev. John Foster, for marrying plaintiff's daughter while under age, without first publishing the bans, was dismissed in the Court of Appeals, the license being considered all that was necessary to empower the minister to celebrate the nuptial ceremony. Gilbert R. Pugsley, Esq., left Winnipeg on Wednesday for St. John, but not before despatching certain interesting Bank checks for large amounts to his friends in St. John, the results of profitable speculation in Winnipeg and Manitoba lands. Mr. Pugsley has handled some \$50,000 of St. John money so skillfully as to return the investors their \$50,000, and about \$40,000 profit, and this realized in a little over two months!—Sun. "Oh! the terrible sugar monopolists. How wealthy they are getting!" shriek the Grits. But not a word about lumber monopolists, who drive tight bargains with small operators and keep the workmen on the smallest wages possible, nor a word about Mr. Gibson's millions, or Mr. Snowball's thousands, but the Lord help a sugar refinery if he makes a dollar.—Mention Times. The St. John Sun says:—A Knitting Machine—probably the most perfect as well as the cheapest in the world—may be seen in operation in the offices of Messrs. T. Sherman Peters and J. Simpson Armstrong, Water street. A movement is on foot here in St. John—which we hope may be successful—to buy the patent rights for the Dominion and establish the manufacture of the machine as well as the manufacture of hosiery and underwear on an extensive scale. Last week a man named John McNeil committed suicide, near the Grand Narrows, in the coolest and most deliberate manner possible. He took a rope and axe from his own door, and going down to the shore he picked up a large stone, and having carried it onto the ice, he calmly cut a large hole in the ice, then lying the stone around his neck he jumped in. The cause of this singular act is not, at present, made public.—Port Hawkesbury Beacon. The Jeannette Expedition.

Lieut. Danenhower, of the Jeannette expedition, has written a letter to his father, Mr. W. W. Danenhower, who resides at Washington. The letter is dated Buluk, mouth of the Lena, November 9th, and to this is added a postscript dated Yakoutsk, December 17th. The trip up the river from Buluk to Yakoutsk occupied 36 days, and was made on sledges with dogs, reindeers and horses. Lieutenant Danenhower describes the journey as one full of severe hardships. At Yakoutsk the Governor treated him with great kindness. He detailed a Lieutenant with instructions to give the wants of the party special attention. In speaking of the terrible voyage of the party, Lieutenant Danenhower says he had to travel 700 miles over ice from the ship to the mouth of the Lena. They landed in shoal water and were compelled to wade two miles on land. They were forced to travel 100 miles further before they reached shelter, and he says he was up five days and four nights without sleep or rest. He mentions the fact that out of the thirty-three comprising the crew and officers of the Jeannette only thirteen are known to be living and one known to be dead.

ABOUT 150 brakemen and conductors connected with the traffic department of several of the railways centering in Toronto, assembled the other day to discuss the wages question. They think a dollar and a half is not enough for a first-class brakeman, now that times are good. At present a man gets \$1 to commence on, and after being at work six months, receives \$1.20, then \$1.40, and after three years' service, \$1.50. With the present rush of through freight, brakemen who receive \$1.50 per day do not average over \$30 per month, and through freight conductors from \$40 to \$45. They ask an increase of ten per cent. on these rates, and several of the best men say if the companies do not comply with their requests they will accept positions which have been offered them on western roads. There is no intention, however, of striking.

The Winnipeg correspondent of the Toronto World writes:—"Now a little advice to those who intend to visit Winnipeg. First, avoid your friends, if they deal in real estate; for when they have been here a short time they lose all sympathy with their fellowmen, and are only looking forward to make their pile and get out. Second, if you come to speculate, you will have to bring not less than \$10,000, and then you have no sure thing; if one is seeking employment, there will be no trouble, as there will be plenty of work to be done this summer; and although labor will be plentiful, and wages good, you must also consider that living will be in proportion, as you cannot get any kind of board and lodging here for less than \$6 per week—that is the cheapest board you can get here at private house, and there is none vacant at that."

A DESPATCH of the 9th inst., from Antigonish to the Halifax Chronicle, says:—At a special meeting of the Municipal Council, held here on Monday, to investigate the accounts of the late treasurer, it was discovered that he is a defaulter to the amount of \$4,500. Criminal proceedings were taken against him by the Council, and he was bound over to the Supreme Court. While in the custody of Deputy Sheriff Smith last night he was forcibly carried off by two men. The Deputy Sheriff made a brave fight to regain his prisoner, but he was overpowered and thrown from the sleigh. The Deputy and Constable O'Brien are now in pursuit, but it is very doubtful whether they will overtake him.

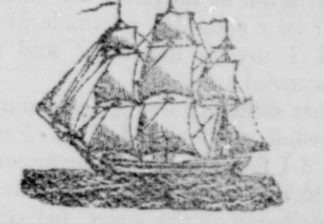
