CURRENT NOTES.

A convention of clergymen and temper-  
ance delegates will be held at Essex Centre  
on Saturday to consider the advisability of  
submitting the Scott Act in the country.

A German has invented a safe that, on  
its lock being tampered with, throws open  
its doors, seizes, and drags and locks in  
the burglar, and handcuffs and holds him  
in readiness to be conducted to the Police  
Court in the morning.

SUGAR.—There arrived from Halifax last  
week 40 cars of sugar for the Moncton re-  
finery. The shipments of refined sugar for  
this week up to yesterday amounted to 404  
barrels. During last month the quantity  
shipped was 4,500 barrels.—Moncton Trans-  
cript.

A JUSTICE'S JUDGMENT.—This occurred  
in New Brunswick. A Justice was asked  
for a copy of a judgment in a certain  
matter. In reply he sent the following:  
"I find an onus on the grounds of know-  
legal return. Been Mad on the justice  
and so and so."

A correspondent of the British Medical  
Journal states that he has found the applica-  
tion of a strong solution of chromic acid  
three or four times, by means of a camel's  
hair pencil, to be the most efficient and  
easy method of removing warts. They be-  
come black, and soon fall off.

Barque "Clandeboyne" Forbes master,  
from Chatham for Dublin, went ashore at  
Magdalen Islands a few days ago, and lost  
anchors and chains. She came off subse-  
quently, and is now at Miramichi bar  
awaiting orders. She is making no water  
and does not appear to be seriously dam-  
aged.

A gentleman, whose business is closely  
connected with the fruit-growing interest,  
states that he has made wide and careful  
enquiries as to the prospects for a crop of  
apples. The reports are uniformly of the  
effect that the outlook is excellent. He  
says that reports from all over the country  
foreshadow a good fruit crop all round—  
berries, peaches, and apples.

The text of the papal acts sent to the  
English-speaking prelates throughout the  
world by the Vatican shows that the Pope's  
letter of the 11th of May merely formulated  
the unchanging policy of the Vatican  
throughout the present pontificate, and that  
the Pope wrote to Cardinal McCabe in  
August last stating that he was confident  
British statesmen would give satisfaction  
to the Irish people if the latter asked what  
was just.

Cyrus Jefferson, an octogenarian, of  
Warsaw, N. Y., who is worth between one  
and two millions, is obliged to emigrate  
from his home to avoid the effect of the  
new state tax law, which requires that the  
owner of personal property wherever, situ-  
ated, shall be taxed where the citizen  
resides. Nine-tenths of Jefferson's money  
is loaned in the Western States, where it  
is taxable also, and he has no alternative but  
to leave the State or to pay \$20,000 extra  
taxation annually. He goes to Minnesota.

The Bath Times says that a gentleman in  
that city has a horse which he has owned  
nine years, and never had a shoe on his  
foot. He thinks the advantages are, viz.:  
that in damp snow the horse's hoof will  
not ball up, and he is sure of his footing.  
Second, that the horse never calks himself  
in deep snow, never wears out floors by  
stamping, and is never lame from having  
shoes that pinch the feet. The horse is in  
good order; the hoof sharp and tough and  
smooth. The owner says that he never yet  
met with an accident, not even so much as  
a stumble.

The important suit in which the share-  
holders of the defunct Consolidated Bank  
are plaintiffs and the ex-directors are de-  
fendants commenced in the Supreme Court  
in Montreal yesterday. The charges are  
failure to supervise the management of the  
officials properly and publishing false and  
deceptive monthly returns. It is held that  
if true statements had been issued one and  
a half million dollars would have been  
saved to the plaintiffs. It was contended  
that Mr. Rankin, the former president, was  
present at all the meetings, and is thus re-  
sponsible for the losses.

The Quebec Chronicle says:—As far as  
can be ascertained the Ministers of the  
Crown will spend their holidays as follows:  
Sir John Macdonald, at Riviere du Loup,  
leaving Ottawa early in July; Sir L. Tilley  
and Hon. Mr. McPherson, in England,  
leaving the Capital on the 16th; Sir Alex-  
ander Campbell will leave at the end of the  
present month for British Columbia; Hon.  
Mr. Chapleau will probably go to the sea-  
side, but his destination is not yet known;  
Hon. John Costigan will shortly leave for  
his home in New Brunswick; Sir Hector  
Langevin, after making an official inspec-  
tion of public works in Ontario, will, in  
August, visit Manitoba, when he expects to  
run through on the Canadian Pacific Rail-  
road to the Rockies; Hon. Mr. Bowell, Hon. J.  
H. Pope and Hon. Mr. Caron, will spend  
the greater portion of the summer season at  
the Capital.

In horses the pulse at rest beats forty  
times, in an ox from fifty to fifty-five, and  
in sheep and pigs about seventy to eighty  
beats per minute. It may be felt wherever  
a large artery crosses a bone, for instance.  
It is generally examined in the horse on the  
cord which crosses over the bone of the  
lower jaw in front of its curved position, or  
in the bony ridge above the eye; and in  
cattle over the middle of the first rib, and  
in sheep by placing the hand on the left  
side, where the beating of the heart may be  
felt. Any material variation of the pulse  
from the figures given above may be con-  
sidered a sign of disease. If rapid, hard,  
and full, it is an indication of high fever or  
inflammation; if rapid, small, and weak, low  
fever, loss of blood, or weakness. If slow,  
the probabilities point to brain disease, and  
if irregular, to heart troubles. This is one  
of the principle and sure tests of the health  
of an animal.
