government in marketing, but usually an organized agency accepts this responsibility and acts as an intermediary between the producer and the government.

Colored Oleo

Ontario has permitted for the past few years, the sale of uncolored oleo, during the winter manufacture of this product encouraged the circulation of petitions among consumers demanding the sale of yellow margarine.

A bill was introduced in the Legislature and met with strong opposition from all parties. The Premier and the leader of the Opposition ably pointed out the critical condition of the dairy industry and stated that colored margarine would mean that eventually the consumer would buy and eat this product believing it to be butter.

In the vote on the bill only four members supported colored oleo.

Potato Troubles

The unpredictable nature of the potato business has once again been demonstrated to the sorrow of a portion of growers who held on for a repetition of last spring's

prices. Equally embarrassed is the group, and they have our sympathy, which for a variety of reasons sold only a portion of their crop or make a practice of selling the crop during the winter months when the pressure of other farm work has eased.

In the absence of definite information on the quantity still left in the Province it is difficult for anyone to decide whether the balance of the crop can all be moved or to make any predictions as to the possibility of improvement in price at a later date.

Estimates of the number of cars on hand vary by over a thousand, if the lower figures are correct their could be some hope for improved prices; if the higher figure is right the future does not hold much hope.

In past years, over-estimation of the crop has cost the grower real money; this season the crop has apparently been underestimated, particularly in the United States, with the result that prices stayed at a high level until the surplus became evident.

Hog Grading

Through the C.F.A. western groups have been demanding that live grading of hogs be made available where so desired by the producer, the east has consistently

opposed the suggestion, but did agree that if live hogs were being exported from Western Canada to the U.S., a system of live grading with the payment of premiums be established.

After due consideration the Federal Department of Agriculture has turned down the request on the grounds that premium payments in such cases might be considered by the United States as bounties for exports and set up counter-vailing impositions.

The Federal Department has decided that the granting of this request would be a mistake.

Income Tax

The April 30th deadline for filing income tax returns will soon roll around and to farmers who must cope with this enjoyable task we suggest in the interest of accuracy that the job be not left to the night before income tax day.

Turnips

The turnip crop while not comparing in value with potatoes does nevertheless bring to a number of farmers considerable income. This season, while prices were good at the start, present values are so low as to make it hardly worthwhile to bother with them.

The Federation and the turnip dealers have each appointed a committee to work jointly in plan-

Planning for improvement in the marketing of this crop. The committee will meet in a few days and it is hoped that a plan may be devised to bring some order into the business during the coming season.

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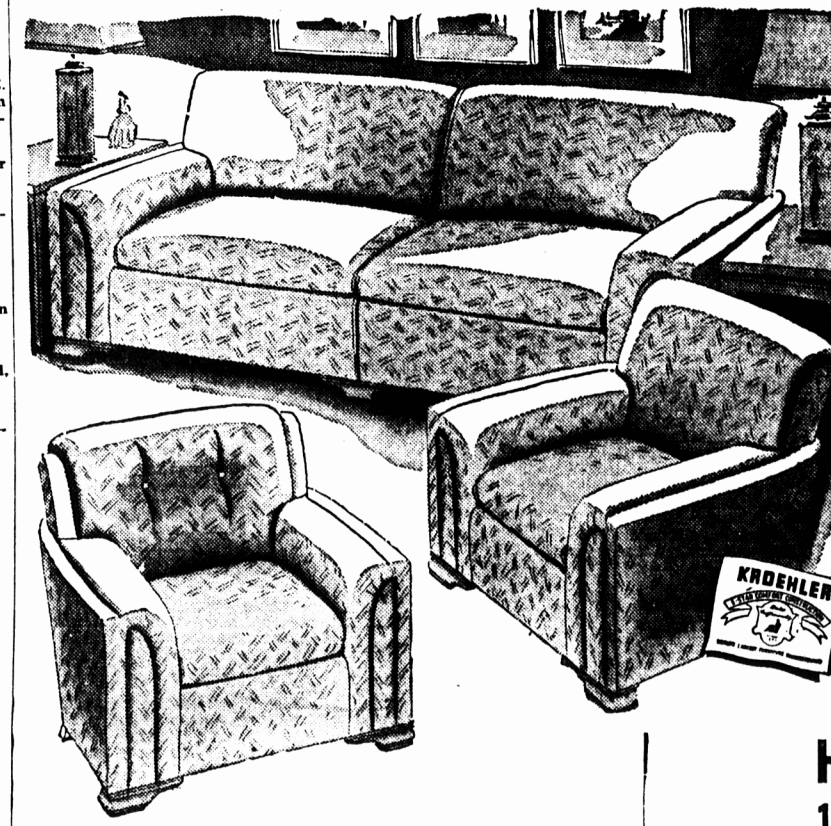
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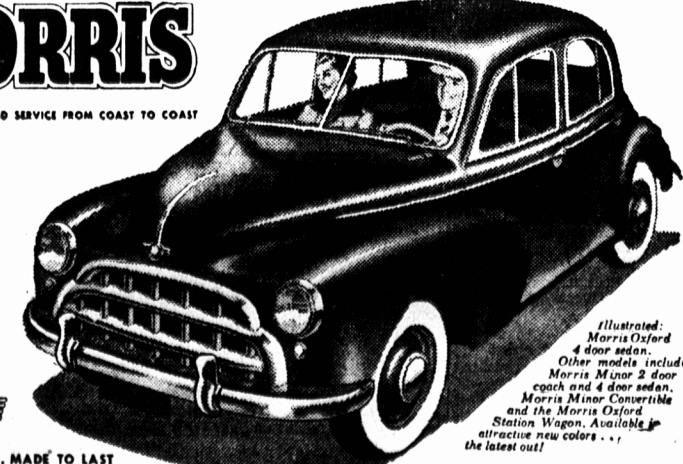
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
