CHURCH-GOERS were sensibly reminded yesterday that our places of worship are miserably ventilated. THE effect of the lightning of Thursday last was felt in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Buildings were shattered in many localities. Mrs. Baker, of Pleasant River, about fifteen miles from Bridgewater, N. S., was struck by lightning and instantly killed, while her husband and two of his family were paralyzed. At Hantsport, N. B., Mr. Stephenson Jinks was struck and instantly killed by lightning.

THE announcement of the sudden death of Mrs. Morris, the wife of Thomas Morris, Esq., which took place on Saturday evening, cast a gloom over the community. The deceased was driving on Tuesday last, and on that day fell suddenly ill, and soon became unconscious. She lingered until Saturday evening at 5 o'clock, when she expired. Mrs. Morris was the eldest daughter of John McGowan, Esq. She was a great favorite in the city, and her untimely death is much deplored. Her funeral, which took place this afternoon, was very largely attended.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

EUROPEAN.

PORTSMOUTH, July 30.

The troop ships are being prepared with the utmost vigor.

LONDON, July 30.

Specials from Vienna, Paris and Berlin state that the journals of those capitals express the opinion that the Afghan disaster is causing less activity in Turkish affairs on the part of England.

The Times says: "We do not believe that Ayoub Khan's power in the field will prove in the long run more formidable than that of any of the other Afghan Sirdars who collected so-called armies and gained temporary successes by surprise or overwhelming numbers against small bodies of British troops."

It is stated that arrangements have been made for the despatch of four or five thousand troops to Afghanistan from England within a few days. The military authorities are prepared to supply from England, within the next fortnight, 12,000 troops of all arms. The Admiralty has signified to the War Department its readiness to provide transportation for 20,000 within three weeks. Gen. Sir Garnet Wolseley came to London yesterday from the Isle of Wight after hearing the news of the disaster at Candahar. A telegram from the Viceroy of India, last night, refers to dispatch of reinforcements from various parts in India. Candahar is provisioned till the end of October.

BOMBAY, July 30.

Information received by the Indian government shows that the military strength of Ayoub Khan has been utterly underrated.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 30.

The Gilos says that with the accession of Abdurrahman Khan as Ameer a phase of Afghan events terminates. Two powerful neighbors of Afghanistan have stretched out to each other hands of reconciliation on the grounds which had become matter of dispute only in consequence of the incurable Russophobia of Lord Beaconsfield. The new Ameer owes his present position quite as much to Russia as to England.

LONDON, July 30.

A despatch from the Viceroy states that reinforcements for Afghanistan are being pushed forward as rapidly as possible and will consist at least of strong brigades with artillery and cavalry.

The troop ships at Portsmouth are being prepared with utmost vigor. Hundreds of men are working over time.

A despatch from Calcutta says that Gen. Sandimann reports that having become anxious about the state of affairs at Candahar and that not having heard from General Burrows in a longer time than usual, and knowing also that Ayoub Khan was en route to Candahar from Herat with a heavy force, he sent reliable men to Candahar to obtain information. At the time of sending his report Gen. Sandimann said his messengers had been ten days absent and he feared they had fallen into the hands of some of Ayoub Khan's scouting parties. It is reported that assistance will be sent at once from Chameen Cheki. This undoubtedly refers to forces under Gen. Phayre, whom Earl Granville stated yesterday in the House of Lords, had been recently stationed at that place. A later despatch, however, contradicts this and states that Gen. Phayre has telegraphed that he is unable to move, and that he will not assume the responsibility of attempting to relieve Candahar until he can have a force at his command strong enough to preclude the possibility of another reverse. A despatch from Simla reports a certain amount of disturbance between Chaman and Candahar on the direct line of advance of any relieving force from the former place. Despatches from Cabul report all tranquil there to-day, and that twenty thousand British troops are in the capital. It is known, however, that these are mostly native levies, whose allegiance cannot be depended upon when there is any temptation to break forth. Hence the situation in Cabul is one of quiet with apprehension of revolt.

LONDON, July 30.

The House of Lords has passed the bill for the relief of Irish distress.

A Berlin despatch says it appears that France has resolved to withdraw her ironclads if the naval demonstration should develop into real action.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 30.

The official notice to the press threatens suspension or suppression if they reproduce the articles of European journals hostile to Turkey. The Greek press is particularly referred to. Mr. Goschen has informed Abeddin Pasha that military preparations on the part of Turkey would precipitate a naval demonstration.

UNITED STATES.

BALTIMORE, July 30.

Capt. Parsons, of the schooner George Washington, from Jamaica, reports that when on the outward passage, off Cape Maize, the eastern point of Cuba, fourteen miles off the coast she was overhauled by a Spanish gunboat, the officers searching the vessel and mustering the crew. They left without doing anything further.

MEMPHIS, July 30.

Steamer City of Vicksburg sank this morning at Ashport, Tenn. The passengers were saved. Boat was valued at \$50,000. Cargo comprised 7,000 packages of merchandise.

WASHINGTON, July 30.

Secretary Evarts says that if upon a thorough investigation it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Administration that the Spanish Government has really insulted the dignity of the United States flag, a demand for reparation will be made.

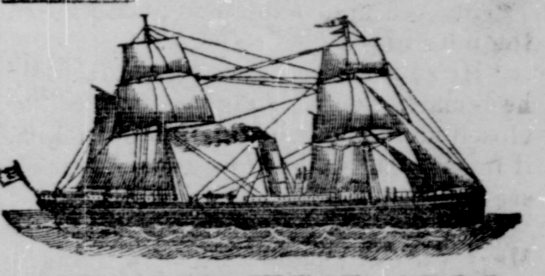
