

Local and Other Items.

CITY COUNCIL meets to-night.

POLICE COURT.—One Scott Act case adjourned. A drunk was cautioned and discharged.

IMPROVEMENTS.—The broken plankways throughout the city are being repaired, and some of the streets are being macadamized. This is right.

KERMIS.—The ladies of St. Peter's Church will hold a Kermis on board the steamer Southport on the 14th June next. St. Peter's Boys' Band will be in attendance, and there will be refreshments and other attractions.

A VALUABLE SITE.—The expropriation commissioners have awarded \$76,216.95 to Mr. G. W. Stephens for the old Herald site on Victoria square, Montreal, and \$728 to Mr. Alex. McDonald for the projection adjoining.

FOR THE AMERICAN MARKET.—Mr. S. B. Titcombe of Bangor, arrived last evening from P. E. Island and Pictou with 11 horses which he bought at these places. He expects to remain in the city to-day by a few more if they can be had.—St. John Sun.

END OF THE WORLD.—Some crank bases a prediction that the end of the world is near, on the fact that the Jews are being speedily gathered back to the Holy Land. In 1880 there were not more than 5,000 Jews in Jerusalem, and now there are more than 30,000. Recent Russian persecutions have led thousands to make their home in the ancient city.

FIRE.—The double-tenement house on Prince Street, near the Ferry Wharf, owned by Hon. W. W. Lord, took fire from the chimney this morning, and were it not for the prompt action of several citizens who were early on the scene, there would have been a serious conflagration. As it was a large hole was burned through the roof. The alarm was not sounded.

QUEEN SQUARE.—The meeting in the Legislative Library on Saturday afternoon to make arrangements for the maintenance of Queen Square Gardens, was not so largely attended as expected, and it was decided, after some discussion, to adjourn until Tuesday forenoon at eleven o'clock, to meet in the same place. It is expected that all interested in the gardens will be present.

STEAMERS MOVEMENTS.—The Galuhar arrived here on Saturday, and leaves on the 23rd to resume her work of surveying in the St. Lawrence.

The steamer William, owned by Messrs. R. McMullan and D. Farquharson, arrived here last evening and is now lying at McMillan's wharf. We understand she made the passage from Bristol Channel in twenty-two days.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.—Toronto, according to the Globe, pays \$200.75 per annum for each electric light. In Toledo fifty lights are supplied for \$40 each. Bay City formerly paid \$100, but the Corporation now does the work for \$42 each light. Lewiston, Maine, does it for \$51.10 on lights burning all night, having formerly paid a company \$257.25 for lights burning only till midnight. Madison, Ind., pays \$55.55 per light. In Charlottetown we pay \$100 per lamp.

PICKED UP.—A young lad called at our office this morning and handed us a piece of paper containing the following, which he said was inside a bottle found by Mr. John McKinnon on Rocky Point shore at seven o'clock this morning:

"Forty miles from Newfoundland: we foundered at sea, Schooner Frederick H. We had no boats to save us, so all on board was lost. Parties who found this would please report it to sister Hettie and mother, living on 26th street, New York."

FROM THE WEST SIDE.—Rev. J. A. Ford, of Milton, Yarmouth, N. S., who has received a call to the Carleton, St. John, N. B., Baptist Church, conducted both services there yesterday. In the morning the Rev. gentleman, taking for his text the 27th verse of the 14th chapter of St. John, preached an able and eloquent sermon. Mr. Ford has already, by his winning manner, made a large number of friends in the congregation, who hope that he will see his way clear to accept their invitation to labor amongst them.—St. John Telegram.

Mr. Ford is a native of East Point, and has been pastor of the Milton Baptist Church, Yarmouth, for three years.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN CONWAY.—Many of our readers will hear with regret of the demise of Captain Thomas Conway, which occurred at the Flatbush Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, on the 29th April. Up to Sunday, the 8th April, he was in the enjoyment of good health; but while at Mass on that day he took a chill, having had no idea of what was wrong. On the following Wednesday a rash came out, which his doctor pronounced smallpox. The case was reported, and he was obliged to leave family and friends and go to the Hospital, where he died after nine days illness. Captain Conway and family resided for many years in this Province, and enjoyed the esteem and confidence of the community generally. He was one of the best of husbands and fathers, was remarkably honest and straightforward in all his business transactions, and, above all, was a sincere and devout member of his Church. The many fine qualities of his sons and daughters will be a fitting memorial to his virtues. We tender our sympathy to his family in their bereavement.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Verdict in the Crocker Case.

HALIFAX, May 13. The full text of the coroner's jury in the Crocker inquest is a long document. They agree unanimously that the Chandler Electric Light Co. did not take the necessary precautions to prevent the occurrence of the accident, and think it was incumbent upon the Company or its agents to enquire fully and exhaustively into the condition of the lamp and its appurtenances (now known to have been unsafe for some time) before they allowed the linen to ascend to the lamp during the time a current was passing. The jury made a number of recommendations for the prevention of accidents in the future.

The Archbishop's Funeral.

TORONTO, May 13. The funeral of Archbishop Lynch takes place on Wednesday morning. Among those who have notified that they will be present on the occasion are Cardinal Taschereau, Archbishops of Montreal and Ottawa; Archbishop Ryan, of Philadelphia; Bishops Ryan, of Buffalo, Dowling, of Peterboro and Walsh, of London. Eloquent tributes were paid to the deceased prelate in the Roman Catholic Churches to-day, and feeling references were also made in several Protestant churches.

Fire at Springhill Mines.

SPRINGHILL MINES, May 13. This morning at 4 o'clock the south slope stables, thirteen hundred feet down the slope, were discovered on fire. Dense volumes of smoke were emitted, but the fire was soon got under control. All pits resume work to-morrow as usual. This pit has been idle three months and is free from gas. The stables are in a damp place and were visited on Saturday night at 9 o'clock and found all right. There will be an investigation.

The Papal Rescript.

LONDON, May 13. Michael Davitt, in a speech to-day, said Irishmen would not be behind O'Connell in resenting the Papal rescript. Ireland had done more for the Church among the people throughout the English speaking world than any other country. It was Rome's gratitude, Irishmen would be likely to ask themselves some questions in the matter.

A Popular Appointment.

MONTREAL, May 13. Rev. Cure Labelle has been appointed Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Colonization Department, of which Premier Mercier is Minister. The appointment gives satisfaction to both sides. He will still continue to minister to the spiritual wants of the people of St. Jerome.

English Armament.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 13. The Novosti says that the object in strengthening English armaments is evidently not solely to be prepared to indirectly partake in an eventual continental war, but also to enable England to pursue with armed hand a policy manifestly aggressive.

Reciprocal Trade.

MONTREAL, May 13. The Halifax branch of the Imperial League are sending an address to the Governor-General requesting that delegates be summoned from Newfoundland, British West Indies and the Australian colonies to confer on the best means of securing reciprocal trade.

Lord Randolph's Opinion.

LONDON, May 13. Lord Randolph Churchill has written a letter to the Telegraph confirming its statements concerning the weakness of the army and navy, saying the same is supported by the highest military authorities.

Extra Precautions.

LONDON, May 13. The Government has ordered two modern 30-ton guns to be mounted on the central bastion facing the sea at Sherness. Other measures of defence will be adopted on the Thames.

Two Wrecks.

MONTREAL, May 13. The Pictou bark Ashante and an Arichat schooner are reported wrecked on the eastern coast by striking the ice. The schooner sank. The bark was run ashore.

Archbishop Lynch's Successor.

TORONTO, May 13. It is expected that Bishop Walsh, of London, will be made Archbishop of Toronto in place of the late Archbishop Lynch.

Abandoned His Intention.

MONTREAL, May 13. It is announced authoritatively that Mr. Mercier has abandoned his contemplated abolition of the Quebec Legislative Council.

An M. P. P. Dead.

MONTREAL, May 13. Mr. Hillar, M. P. P. for Chicoutimi and Saguenay, died yesterday in Quebec, of typhoid fever, aged 52 years.
