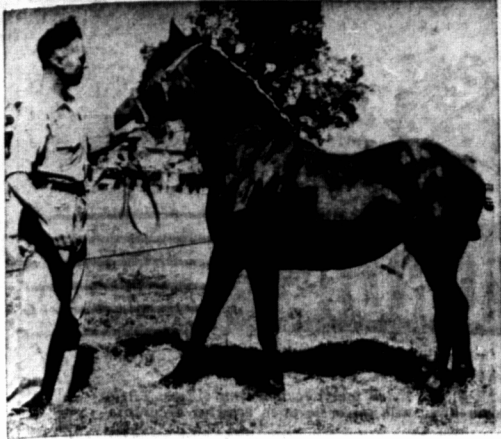

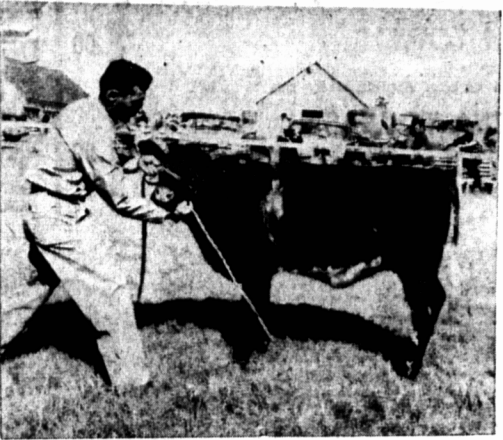

Old friends in Summerside of Gertrude Arbutnot will be saddened to learn of her death on August 11th, in Capetown, South Africa, where she had been living for the last two years. She taught school for several years in Summerside and was one of the three teachers from the Island chosen to go to South Africa after the Boer War. She taught in Rhodesia and there married Robert Macintosh, superintendent of education in Southern Rhodesia. They had one daughter, Dorothy, who after graduating from college entered the civil service and later was on the staff of Rhodesia House in London. Mrs. Macintosh had two brothers, Harry and Williams and a sister, May, all living in Vancouver. Another sister, Mrs. L.A. Moore well known here, who has lately retired from teaching is also living now in Vancouver.

In the cattle classes, Ayrshires, Guernseys, Jerseys, Shorthorns and dual purpose Shorthorns were judged yesterday. W. A. Moose and Son were the chief exhibitors of Ayrshires. Roy O'Meara, a new exhibitor, carried off a fair number of prizes. The champion junior male was shown by O'Meara, the champion junior female by Mona Coughlin, and the champion senior female by Moose and Son.

All Guernsey championships went to Harold Palmer and Son and all Jersey championships to Edwin Lord and Son.

Principal Shorthorn exhibitors were Ivan Clark and Son and Ralph K. Adams. The exhibition special prize for the champion bull was awarded to Clark and Son, who also won the junior female championship. The senior female champion was shown by Mr. Adams.

Ivan Clark and Son and Robert MacLaurin and Son were the chief exhibitors of dual purpose Shorthorns. The champion males were shown by Clark and Son, the junior female champion by MacLaurin and Son, and the senior female champion by Arnold Barrett.

SHEEP CLASSES
Cheviot, Oxford and Shropshire sheep were judged yesterday. Henry Wedge, Arnold Wood and Sons and Sylvère J. F. Arsenault were the main exhibitors of Cheviots. Prizes for the best flock went to Wedge, Arsenault, Edmond Bernard and Wood and Sons.

Ivan Bowness, Ray Shea and Joseph O'Rourke won prizes for the best flock of Oxfords. Hudson Pridham and Son and W.A. Moose were the chief exhibitors of Shropshires. Prizes for the best flock went to Pridham and Son.

Joseph O'Rourke received first prize for his pen of four market lambs. For the best sheep shown Henry Wedge received the Holman prize and the Canadian Tire Company prize.

SWINE CLASSES
The best hog was shown by Leonard Morrell who received the Holman and Canadian Tire Company prizes. The Robert E. Campbell special prizes for best showing of bacon hogs weighing between 190 and 230 lbs. went to Frank Bryan and Frank Barbour. The best bacon hog weighing 190 to 230 lbs was shown by Hudson Pridham. The best sow under 18 months with litter was shown by Norman Warren and the best sow over 18 months with litter by Leonard Morrell.

POTATO CHAMPION
Potato champion of the exhibition is Mrs. Harry MacDonald who has won this honour on several occasions. Owing to the late season the showing of squash, pumpkins, cabbage, etc. was not very large but there was a fairly good showing of root vegetables. The collections of garden vegetables are one of the most interesting features in their class. Mrs. Claude Lewis retained her record as an offtime winner in this section. In her collection were some fifty varieties. Other prize winners were Mrs. Robert Oulton, Mrs. R.E. Lockery, Lilias Yeo, Wilson Christopher and George Shaw.

The collections of fruit are also an interesting attraction. In her first prize collection Jean Webb had approximately twenty-five varieties. The other collection, also a creditable one, was Mrs. Robert Oulton's. These exhibitors received the Cyril and Roy Leard special prizes. An additional stand made it possible for flowers to be shown more satisfactorily this year. Prominent among the potted plants was a huge beautifully proportioned sword fern shown by Mrs. Orria Wallace.

Outstanding dahlias collections were exhibited by Mrs. John Rayner and Jean Webb. Beautiful gladioli and sweet peas were admired. The only roses, exhibited by Mrs. John H. Wells, merited well the first prize they received.

Belgian Aircrew Receive Training On Canadian CF-100

Ten members of the Royal Belgian Air Force are being given conversion training on the CF-100 all-weather interceptor in Canada by the R.C.A.F., it was announced by Air Force Headquarters.

The group of Belgian flyers, five pilots and five observers, started training this week at the R.C.A.F.'s all-weather operational training unit, Cold Lake, Alta., scheduled to finish in early November, and the Belgian crews will return to their own country to form a nucleus of a training unit there, to instruct Belgian aircrew destined for CF-100 service.

Belgium is receiving Canadian built CF-100 interceptors, designed and produced by Avro Aircraft of Malton, Ont., under a Canadian-United States mutual aid agreement.

The 10 Belgian flyers receiving the Cold Lake training are experienced in all-weather jet operations, having flown Gloster Meteors. They will represent the first group of foreign aircrew ever to receive CF-100 training. The all-weather operational training unit at Cold Lake provides conversion training to the CF-100 for R.C.A.F. aircrew having finished the normal flying training course and having received their wings. R.C.A.F. crews also receive weapons and tactical training while there, and on finishing the course are transferred to squadron duty to begin actual operational service.

Another successful year of Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety instruction came to a close August 9th in the Alberton area, when Mr. Paul Cudmore, Red Cross Field Supervisor examined the well prepared class at Mill River. This year's course under the sponsorship of a local committee with Mr. Henry Clark as Chairman, had for their instructor Miss Martha Meyer, Bloomfield. Kensington Has Good Students

Four Kensington High School students excelled themselves in the 1957 Provincial Examinations as well as many more of the students passing with fine marks. In Grade XII Iris Champion and Barbara Sinclair stood first and second respectively in the Province. Iris is the daughter of Mrs. William Champion and the late Mr. Champion of Kensington. She attained a total of 636 marks out of a possible 700. This represents an average of 90.9 percent. In five of the subjects, Iris received a mark of over 90 percent. These were Geometry 92 percent, Biology 97 percent, Algebra 96.7 percent, Chemistry 94 percent and History 91 percent.

Barbara Sinclair attained a total of 629 marks, an average of 89.9 percent. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Crawford Sinclair of Springfield. Included in Barbara's marks were Algebra, 100 percent, Geometry 96 percent, Chemistry 95 percent, Biology 92 percent and French 90 percent. Both Iris and Barbara successfully completed the work of eight fall subjects.

In Grade XI Earle Lockerby tied for first place in the Province and Margaret Murray placed third. Earle is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Lockerby of Hamilton and he received a total of 750 marks out of a possible 800. This represents an average of 93.8 percent. Included in this total were seven subjects with over 90 percent. These were: Chemistry 100 percent, Geometry 99 percent, Physics 98 percent, Algebra 98 percent, Biology 97 percent, Latin 96 percent, French 94 percent.

Margaret Murray is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. L.M. Murray of Kensington. She received a total of 724 marks. This is an average of 90.5 percent. Included in these marks were Biology 99 percent, Geometry 99 percent, Algebra 96 percent, Chemistry, 95 percent.

Eight subjects constitute a full course in Grade XI but both Margaret and Earl successfully

completed the work of nine subjects. Also to be congratulated are the successful students who wrote the Grade X Examinations, Elizabeth Ramsay a Kensington Student was one of the Prince County winners of the Bell Scholarship, having attained a mark of 690. Elizabeth is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Ramsay, Hamilton. Following closely in marks was Sheila Caseley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Caseley of Kelvin Grove.

Junior Matriculation (any course): An average of 60 per cent, with no mark below 50 per cent, on the following seven subjects: English, Algebra, Geometry, one foreign language, and any three from: History, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Trigonometry, French, Latin, Greek, German, Spanish, Music and Economics.

Senior Matriculation Credits

A. For B.A. and Secretarial Sciences: 50 per cent on any five of the following: English, French, Latin, German, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics (50 per cent on each paper), History (or Social Problems).

B. For B.Sc.: the same, but with 65 per cent on each Mathematics paper (for admission to Maths. 2) and 75 per cent on an approved laboratory notebook in Chemistry (for admission to Chem. 3).

C. For Engineering: 50 per cent on English, Physics, a foreign language (or History), 65 per cent on each paper in Mathematics, 75 per cent in Chemistry (and an approved laboratory notebook).

D. For Home Economics: 50 per cent in English, a foreign language and Mathematics (also an elective in the case of Home Economics Education).
