

To Call Tenders At Once For S side Runway Project

An announcement by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., for Prince County, and parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries revealed yesterday that tenders will be called immediately for the extension of one of the runways at the Summerside R.C.A.F. Air Station, extending the runway from 6,000 to 8,000 feet in length and from 150 feet wide to a new width of 200 feet.

The contract will be in excess of a million dollars, and when completed there will be only two runways of greater length anywhere in Canada. These are at airports near Ottawa and Vancouver.

The extension at Summerside will allow sufficient room for the world's largest aircraft to land and take-off on its paved surface which will extend in a straight line for more than 1 1/4 miles in a direction from north east to south west.

The runway extension will cut across the present North St. Eleanor's highway just west of the North St. Eleanor's school, and this will necessitate the closing of this part of the road and the construction of a new road which will permit highway traffic around the end of the runway extension.

The information concerning the calling of tenders for the completion of the extension was received by Mr. MacNaught at noon yesterday in a telegram from Ottawa

Mrs. John P. Wallace and Mrs. Lloyd Will'e were preparing for the domestic science exhibits which this year, for the first time, will be displayed in sanitary and attractive glass showcases.

At the office Mrs. James Hodgson, Mrs. Charles Johnston and Mrs. Fred Leard, assistants to the secretary, were in their usual places.

During the day there was limited activity here but in the evening more entries were being made and this morning will find it the busiest place on the grounds.

Entries of livestock were being made yesterday and will be completed this morning. A large new cattle barn will provide comfort for the animals and convenience for their owners this year.

The secretary, Mr. Winston Currie, is probably the busiest man in town at exhibition time but he always seems to be available when needed and ready to provide information on any subject in an efficient and courteous manner. A number of directors are to be found busily engaged in various tasks.

This year meals will again be served by members of Alberton pastoral charge of the United Church of Canada and there will be three canteens on the grounds. There is also a novelty booth and for amusement the Elliott Shows are setting up four types of rides, two of which are especially for children.

For the second season the exhibition will be a two-day affair. This year it is being held two weeks earlier than in recent years and it is anticipated that, with a large number of tourists still in the Province, the attendance will reach a record peak.

Kensington And District Out For 250 Blood Donors

Residents of Kensington and the surrounding districts will set the pace for other sections of the province when they go out to beat all their previous excellent records with an objective of 250 donors at the Red Cross clinic to be held in St. Mark's Hall on Monday next afternoon and evening. This will be the only clinic of next week's series to take place in Prince County and Mr. Gordon S. Cooke, manager of the Kensington branch of Canada Packers, who is again heading up the arrangements for the Kensington clinic is confident that the citizens of that locality will, as they have in the past, respond whole-heartedly to the urgent appeal for blood donors.

Closely associated with Mr. Cooke in this endeavour is the Kensington branch of the Canadian Legion which, under the leadership of Mr. W.L. Miller, secretary, is sponsoring this clinic. Legion representatives in many of the districts in the Kensington area have been asked to co-operate with the Women's Institutes in securing donors for the Kensington clinic.

It will take the combined efforts of all organizations and individuals in this section to make the Kensington clinic 100 per cent successful. This will be the first time that Kensington has had an afternoon as well as an evening clinic and as well as an opportunity for the donors of Kensington itself to attend in the afternoon, avoid the congestion at night, and in the way leave the evening clinic free for the residents of the other districts in this area who might find it difficult to attend in the afternoon.
