30-Year-Old Son Killed in Accident

John Kaptein, 30-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Kaptein, Mt. Stewart, was killed yesterday morning when two wheels of a tractor-pulled hay wagon ran over him.

Working at the hay on his father's farm, John, his father and two other men were hauling in a load when the accident happened. The boy was riding on the wagon with his tractor and William Coffin while Harold Coode drove the tractor. All are from Mt. Stewart.

When his father's hat blew off the youngster jumped down and retrieved it. Attempting to get back on the load, he climbed on the bar hooking the wagon to the tractor but lost his balance and fell back to the ground. Both wagon wheels on the one side ran over him.

He was rushed to the Mt. Stewart office of Dr. George G. Sheppard, but died five minutes after arrival. The accident occurred at 10:45. An autopsy was performed yesterday, but Coroner Dr. G. A. Cooney ruled no inquest was necessary.

U. K. Will Lift Apple Quota

OTTAWA (CP)—Britain is to remove its import quota for apples from the United States as a result of a trade agreement with the United States.

The quota, now set at \$2,000,000 a year, will be removed Aug. 1, clearing the way for an intensified sales campaign by the United States in the United Kingdom and Western European countries.

The quota, which sends 98 per cent of its canned apple exports to Britain, has the highest sales in the world. The nearly 72,000 hundredweight imported by Britain in the first five months of this year, 4,000 came from this country.

"Now that the restrictions are off, we should be able to ship a lot more," said the growers.

Last year, the value of Canadian apples sent to Britain totalled \$18,000,000, about \$200,000 from 1963. But officials said this does not necessarily mean Canada did last year. There is little relationship between the calendar year and the crop year.

Religious Revolt Said Controllable

LUSAKA (Reuters)—Prime Minister Kenneth Kaunda returned from the fanatical Lumpa sect area Wednesday night saying he was confident police and troops would control the Northern Rhodesian religious revolt in which more than 40 persons have died.

During the day the prime minister flew to the Chinsali area with Governor Sir Evelyn Hoare. After flying back Kaunda said he had addressed a large meeting of 'angry and disturbed' villagers to warn people against taking retaliatory action against the Lumpa followers.

The premier said he had conferred with local officials but had not seen any of the Lumpa leaders. He declined to comment when asked whether the government intended to arrest Lumpa prophets Alex Leshishwa.

The first death outside the Chinsali area, the headquarters of the fanatical Lumpas, was reported Wednesday. One man was killed and two hurt were

buried in the Isoka district, 30 miles to the northeast. Chinsali is 450 miles northeast of Lusaka.

The government of this British protectorate issued a warning against travelling along a 200-mile stretch of highway between Mpika and the Tanganyika border.

A spokesman said the road might be dangerous, especially at night. He added emergency powers assumed by Hoare might be used to close it to night traffic.

4,000 Photographs Of Moon Envisioned

By RALPH HIGHTON PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Ranger 7 cruised on course toward the moon Wednesday night and jubilant scientists gave it an 80 per cent chance of returning the first close-up pictures of unknown terrain where United States astronauts may land.

They predicted it will amass at 5,800 miles an hour into the sea of clouds at 10:25 a.m. A.D.T. Friday.

If all goes well the insect shaped spacecraft's six television cameras will return more than 4,000 photographs in the first 15 minutes before destruction, to provide the first success in the trouble-plagued \$200,000 U.S. lunar exploration program.

Ranger Project Manager Harris Schurmerler, who gave the 80 per cent estimate, told the press conference at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

"We have passed the major problem of mid-course manoeuvre and the vehicle now is cruising. We are studying to determine whether there is a need for a final manoeuvre about an hour before impact to train cameras at the best angle."
