She has won several silver and  
gold medals; also a medal of  
merit for leading her class in all  
Canada; also gold certificate. To  
win this a cow must produce 2-  
000 lbs. fat in 1,461 days. Sal had  
2,325 lbs. in 1,160 days, 325 lbs.  
more than the required amount in  
301 days less than the required  
time.

The dam of this bull has a rec-  
ord of 854 lbs. fat in 305 days,  
leading in all Canada and a ton  
of gold with 2,222 lbs. fat in 1,461  
days, and classified excellent.

Lindsay Blames Adams For  
Trade To Chicago Black Hawks

DETROIT (AP) - Little Ted  
Lindsay's sensational and often  
stormy career with the Detroit  
Red Wings ended on a note of dis-  
cord Wednesday when the fiery  
forward accused Wing General  
Manager Jack Adams of "criti-  
cizing me off the club."

Departing from the team he  
vowed he never would leave, the  
veteran campaigner—one of hock-  
ey's highest scorers and most  
penalized players—said he agreed  
to a six-player trade with the Chi-  
cago Black Hawks because of  
"personal resentment by Adams  
against me."

The Red Wings sent Lindsay and  
all-star goalie Glenn Hall to the  
Hawks and got four players —  
Johnny Wilson, Forbes Kennedy,  
Hank Bassen and Bill Preston —  
and "a considerable sum of cash"  
in return.

"It got to the point where I  
couldn't take it any more," said  
Lindsay, ending 13 productive sea-  
sons with the Red Wings. "The  
fans in Detroit are the greatest  
and my relations with the players  
have been wonderful. But I've had  
enough."

Adams, a Detroit hockey figure  
for 30 years, said earlier "all  
these wild rumors of personal dif-  
ferences between Lindsay and my-  
self are without foundation." He  
said he made the trade because  
"I'm convinced it is best for the  
team."

Lindsay has averaged about \$14-  
500 annually since he broke in with  
the Red Wings in 1944. He said  
his contract with the Hawks—who  
have been in last place in the Na-  
tional Hockey League eight of the  
past 10 seasons—is "generally bet-  
ter than any I've had here." Lin-  
dsey, nearing his 32nd birthday but  
still regarded as one of the game's  
greatest performers, said he  
turned down a two-year proposal  
with the Black Hawks.

Some time ago the Detroit club  
gave James D. Norris, the Hawks'  
president, permission to bargain  
with Lindsay. The Wing veteran  
said no, announcing he would  
close out his career where he  
started it, in Detroit.

Lindsay said at a news confer-  
ence Wednesday: "However, a  
series of rumors about my atti-  
tude as well as derogatory state-  
ments about myself and my fam-  
ily showed me that the personal  
resentment of the Detroit general  
manager toward me would make  
it impossible for me to continue  
playing hockey here in Detroit."
