

# Mining Magnate Presents Paintings To N.B. Gallery

TORONTO (CP)—Twenty valuable early Canadian paintings by the 19th century artist Cornelius Krieghoff are to be presented as a gift to the people of New Brunswick.

Mining magnate M. J. (Jim) Boylen of suburban Etobicoke is splitting his collection to provide the Lord Beaverbrook Art Gallery in Fredericton, scheduled to open in September, with one of the world's finest collections of the artist's works.

"It breaks my heart to part with them," said Mr. Boylen who started his collection "many years ago" and has 62 canvases. The 20 paintings are valued at \$100,000.

Two Krieghoffs from the Boylen collection have already been sent to the New Brunswick gallery, joining five others including publisher Lord Beaverbrook's own acquisition, Merry-making. It was purchased two years ago for \$25,000.

Mr. Boylen, who worked in his

Mr. Boylen's paintings will join others by Gainsborough, Reynolds, Turner, Hogarth, Constable, Sargent, Augustus John, Graham Sutherland, and many others donated by Lord Beaverbrook and valued at about \$1,500,000.

Cornelius Krieghoff, whose paintings are eagerly pursued throughout North America and Britain, landed in New York from Germany in 1837 at the age of 22. After serving with the United States army he moved to Canada. He settled first at Longueuil, Que., then Montreal and later in Quebec City.

He lived and worked among the habitants and pushed out into the forest following trappers and camping with Indians to find the scenes and settings for his paintings.

## New ROP Records Are Made By Several Island Jerseys

Several Island Jerseys established new ROP records in the month of January according to reports carried in the Canadian Jersey Breeder, official publication of the Canadian Jersey Association.

In the mature class River North Jester's Patsy, a 8-year-old, owned by A.J. Boswell of Charlottetown, produced 12,272 pounds of milk, 696 pounds butterfat testing 5.67 percent.

Chief's Peggie, a 6-year-old, owned by Bruce MacDonald, New Wilshire, produced 10,370 pounds of milk, 617 pounds of butterfat, testing 6.24 percent.

Myersbrook Royal Cheryl, a 5-year-old, owned by E.A. Myers, Charlottetown, produced 8,855 pounds of milk, 499 pounds of butterfat, testing 5.64 percent.

Ginger Queen M.G., a 7-year-old, owned by Clark Bros. New Wilshire, produced 8,998 pounds of milk, 485 pounds of butterfat, testing 5.39 percent.

In the three year senior class, River North Brecon Maid, owned by James Vickerson, North River, produced 8,022 pounds of milk, 470 pounds butterfat, testing 5.86 percent. Charlottetown, produced 7,744 pounds of milk, 434 pounds of butterfat, testing 5.60 percent.

In the two year senior class, Myersbrook Mily's Dream, owned by E.A. Myers, Charlottetown, produced 7,289 pounds of milk, 420 pounds of butterfat, testing 5.90 percent.

Hedgelee Jester Karen, owned by Clark Bros. New Wilshire, produced 6,497 pounds of milk, 415 pounds of butterfat, testing 6.39 percent.

Also mentioned are animals who qualified in the four thousand and pound cow class. These include:

Hedgelee Alma, owned by Clark Brothers, New Wilshire produced 87,401 pounds of milk, 4,459 pounds of butterfat.

River North Oscar's Star, owned by James Vickerson, North River, reduced 65,466 pounds of milk, 4,360 pounds of butterfat.

Hector's Star, owned by J.H. Clark, New Wilshire, produced 63,039 pounds of milk, 4042 pounds of butterfat.

Increasing their 4,000 pound record during the year 1958 were Hedgelee Standard Pearl, owned by Clark Brothers, New Wilshire, produced 91,470 pounds of milk, 5,118 pounds butterfat; and River North Poppy, owned by A.J. Boswell, Charlottetown, who produced 85,744 pounds of milk, 4,902 pounds of butterfat.

A Canadian Press survey from 6 p.m. local time Friday until 9 p.m. Sunday night showed Quebec led the country with seven deaths including one man killed in a plane crash and another in a fire.

Miscellaneous deaths across the country included drowning, asphyxiation, and electrocution.

The totals with traffic fatalities in brackets: Alberta 3 (2); Manitoba 4 (3); Ontario 2 (2); Quebec 7 (3); Nova Scotia 1; Newfoundland 1.

## Gov't Official Dies At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) — W. D. Matthews, 52, assistant undersecretary of state for external affairs, in charge of administration, died Sunday.

A native of Toronto, he joined the department in 1943 but served earlier as an attaché in Washington from 1923 to 1930 when the department was first being organized.

Before the Second World War, he practised law with a Toronto firm and was with the Foreign Exchange Control Board in Ottawa prior to his appointment as chief administrative officer at the external affairs department in 1943.

He served as minister at the Canadian Embassy in Washington from 1949 to 1952 and as minister to Sweden and Finland from 1952 to 1953.

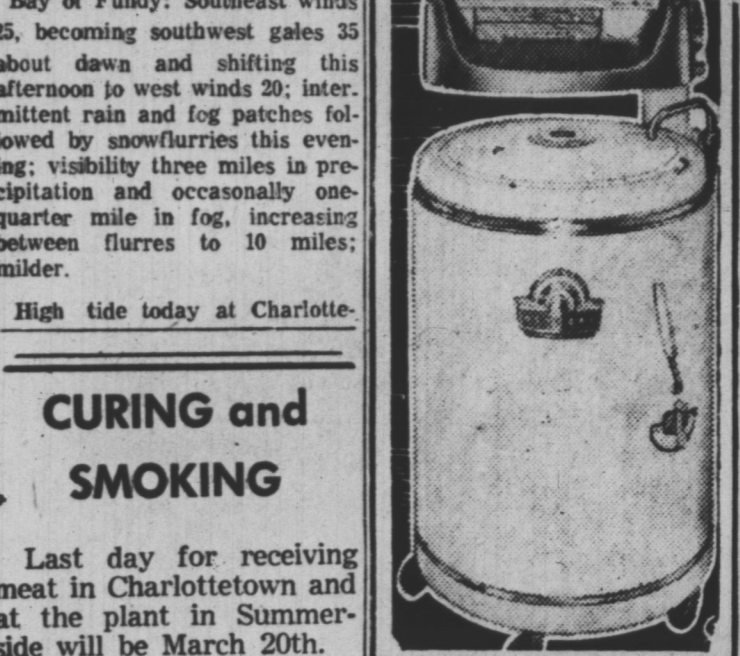
