SUMMERSIDE — A building, used as a workshop and containing valuable machines and tools, was a garage and small shed, owned by Stanley Poirier, St. Nicolas were destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. A small quantity of lumber was also lost but a car was removed from the garage in time.

Mr. Poirier was working on and told him to stop the engine.

He threw a blanket over the machine to smother the flames and he did so the gas tank exploded in a minute the whole building was engulfed in flames.

Meanwhile a nearby neighbor Mr. Cyrus Blacouers while shaking out a mop, noticed the flames and notified the Miscouche fire department.

The Poirier Home was in danger for some time which resulted in the other fire departments being summoned to the scene. It was reported there was no insurance on the buildings or contents.

Tax Sharing Revolution Is Cause of Concern

Reductions in payments to provinces under new fiscal tax arrangements, as shown in the federal government's 1962-63 estimates, should be a matter for discussion at the next federal-provincial fiscal conference, Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday.

The estimates, tabled in the House of Commons, show that payments will drop to provinces to \$219,281,000 from \$233,500,000. "It would be serious if these amounts are reduced," Premier Shaw said. "The government here," he said, "feels that, with driving provincial tax resources, the amounts to us, under the arrangement with Ontario, would be increased rather than reduced."

That would be our consideration in any discussions with Ontario on fiscal matters."

According to Premier Shaw, reductions in the province are not at their limit. We depend on present levels of income to carry out our program and, in future, additional revenue will be needed to carry up this program."

Bonshaw Youth Is Fined \$20 As Result Of Speeding Court

A Bonshaw youth, Norman Brent MacRae, was convicted on a charge of speeding in city police court yesterday after pleading not guilty before Magistrate A.J. Haslam.

Cory W.A. Wilson of the RCMP was called as a witness and in his testimony described seeing the accused averring as he came down Malpeque Road leaving four skid marks on the pavement. He said the accused increased speed when he drove along side to tell him to stop.

Mr. MacRae said he did not know the car which was in front of him, although he pulled along side. He explained that the reason he had increased speed was to avoid another car.

In passing sentence, Magistrate Haslam told the accused that if he couldn't see a car that was right beside him, he shouldn't be driving at all.

MacRae was fined \$20 and costs of ten days.

Summerside Bureau Of The Guardian

Walter Joseph (Peasuts) Arsenault was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary yesterday by Mr. Justice R.R. Bell, QC, after being convicted earlier this week by a petit jury of a reduced charge of being unlawfully found inside a dwelling house with intent to commit an indictable offence.

The original charge on the indictment was of breaking and entering a dwelling house and committing assault.

ASKS SUSPENSION
Defence Counsel J. Harold Goodwin, in his statement to the court prior to sentence, said and accused was a man of 27 years of age with a wife and three small children. He asked His Lordship to consider this in sentencing Arsenault, as well as the fact he had no previous criminal record. Mr. Goodwin said he felt a suspended sentence or, at most, a short jail term would meet the ends of justice.

Crown Prosecutor George R. McMahon said Mr. Goodwin failed to mention the protection of the public and of widows such as Mrs. L.G. Lewis, the victim of the offence.

Mr. McMahon termed it "a vicious crime" for which accused should receive 10 years imprisonment.

Judge Bell told accused, before passing sentence, he had been charged originally with a crime for which he could be sentenced to life imprisonment. "You received a fair trial and a splendid defence," His Lordship said.

S'ide Man Given 2-Year Sentence

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Second Also Gets Prison

SUMMERSIDE — Cecil (Moak) Arsenault, Summerside, was sentenced in police court to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary yesterday by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, QC, for breaking and entering Gouldie's drug store on the night of April 10.

Arsenault was found in the store by police, lying at the bottom of the basement stairs, unconscious, in a pool of blood.

Last week, a Supreme Court jury acquitted Donald Joseph (Wicky) Gallant of being an accomplice in the break. A man, identified by Const. Gordon Gray as being Gallant, escaped from the drug store when surprised by the constable.

Arsenault pleaded guilty to the charge when he appeared in police court the day following the break.
