JUNE SITTING OF SUPREME COURT OPENS

Chief Justice Mathieson Presides—Court Hears Appeal Cases.

One appeal was allowed in Supreme Court yesterday, two were adjourned for judgment and one was still before the court as the June session for Queen's County got underway.

His Lordship Chief Justice J. A. Mathieson presided at the opening and addressed the Grand Jury. The Bench also was Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, assistant judge who heard the appeal cases. The Grand Jury completed its work of visiting and reporting on the public institutions, including Falconwood Hospital, the insane, the Provincial Infirmary and Queen's County Jail. The Jury would consider the four bills of indictment when the Court resumed at 10:30 this morning. It was announced.

Britons Prepare For Long "Seige" From Japanese

London Hopes For Early Settlement In Dispute As Tokyo Takes "Resolute" Stand.

TIENSIN, June 21—(Wednesday)—One hundred British women and children were evacuated from Tientsin's blockaded British Concession today as the second week of Japan's "siege" began.

The women and children began a 200-mile voyage to Peitaiho, north on the China coast. With their departure the British male community in the isolated British and French Concessions considered itself in a better position to take care of itself in the long-drawn test of patience that was foreseen. The women and children had been most inconvenienced by the lack of milk and fresh food.
