

Base Hospitals Staffed By Canadians In Egypt

ABU SUWEIR, Egypt (CP)—
The strained face of the young Yugoslav lieutenant looked up at the Canadian medical officer in a broken English he wanted to know two things: Would he walk again and could he meet and thank the Canadian soldier who had given him blood to survive the delicate repair operations.

It was a scene that not only demonstrates the vital and humanitarian role of the Canadian base hospital here but also places in sharp relief the spirit of respect and understanding in the United Nations Emergency Force's 12-nation police army.

The lieutenant was the most severely wounded of three when a forward patrol jeep of the Yugoslav battalion was blown up by a land mine. He was given preliminary treatment at the advance Norwegian field hospital

and then was evacuated by RCAP Otter plane to this base. **SURGERY WORKED**
Maj. Alan Davidson of Winnipeg and Toronto performed a series of delicate surgical repair and skin grafting jobs on his legs and one hand and was able to tell him they would be saved. Later the Yugoslav was introduced to W.O. A. P. Green of Fredericton who furnished the blood. There was a tear in the lieutenant's eye as he grasped the sergeant-major by the hand and said "Thank you."

Sgt. Marc Mongeau of Montreal supplied blood for another Yugoslav undergoing similar though less serious surgery. "Our Canadian troops on the base are our mobile blood bank—we have them all typed," said Lt.-Col. Stuart Hittman, 36, of Kingston, Ont., who is hospital chief.

MET EMERGENCIES
Like the rest of the UNEF, the base hospital developed "as it grew—like topsy," meeting the exigencies of the situation as they arose and dividing the work with the Norwegian hospital according to facilities.

All national units have their own regimental medical officers who feed the cases back to the Canadian base unit as is necessary. There are 50 Canadians on the base hospital staff, along with two Indian medical assistants and Scandinavian and Yugoslav Liaison officers. Also on the staff are Maj. Alex Reed of Kentville, N.S., and Edmonton, the Canadian hygiene officer; Maj. Robert Hetherington of Montreal; Capt. Jack Haley of Medicine Hat, Alta., and Toronto; and Capt. Victor Mc-

Pherson of Victoria and White Rock, B.C. **CHECK FOOD**
Another staff member is Capt. J. A. McGregor of Edmonton, who served at Abu Suweir as an airman with the RAF during the Second World War. He remembers the base as a floral beauty spot, which is hard for some of his colleagues to believe when they look at the debris of invasion and months of neglect during the Egyptian take-over.

Maj. Reed makes a constant check on all food entering the camp, insisting that all fresh vegetables be soaked in chlorine before they go to the tables. Both the food and Egyptian food handlers are inspected daily and a close check is made of the water supply and the disposal of garbage.

The Canadians have no psychiatrist. "When we get a case that needs that sort of treatment," said Col. Hittman, "we just use common sense. Sometimes we send the patient to the padre."

Cpl. Leo Bernier of Montreal and North Bay, Ont., was making laboratory tests involving an Indonesian patient. "We don't care where they come from or what they are," said the corporal earnestly. "We look upon them all as patients needing the best service that we can give them—and that's what we're doing."

P. E. I. Soldier Serves In Egypt

ABU SUWEIR, Egypt. — A Cardigan soldier who recently graduated into the Regular Army under the soldier-apprentice training scheme is now serving with No. 56 Infantry Workshop, RECM-E, working out of the Canadian-managed UNEF base here.

He is Cpl. W.H. Gardiner of Cardigan P.E.I. whose unit is one of those providing administrative support to the 10-nation force now deployed in the Sinai Desert. He is a qualified armourer group 2.

His unit is responsible for the heavy repairs made to vehicles of the force which cannot be fixed by the units themselves. Among his problems which are peculiar to the UNEF is the multitude of languages that abound in the force. Quite often sign language is used by the Canadians in order to find out the requirements of the various contingents.

Added to the harsh living conditions at the base camp is the winter season which has set in bringing sandstorms, some rain and bitterly cold nights with no heating provided.

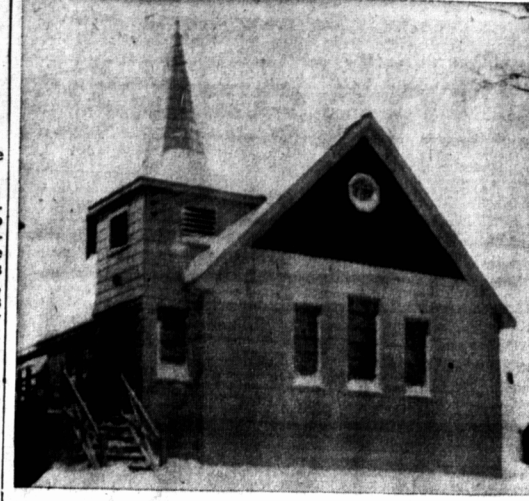

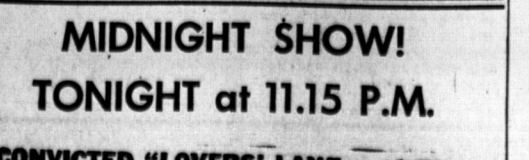
