HAPPY NEW YEAR TO ALL.

NO EXAMINER TOMORROW - New Year's Day.
The storm drum was ordered up this afternoon.
THE Y. M. C. A. intend holding a bazaar early in April.
SMALL attendance at the market to-day. Prices unchanged.
THE ice on the river is now sufficiently strong to carry men and horses.
THE usual Gospel Service in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, Sunday afternoon, at 4 o'clock.
THE Excelsior Rink, Kent Street, will be open for the season on New Year's evening at 7.45.
SHOOTING for prizes this evening and to-morrow (New Year's), at the King Street Rifle Gallery.
ARRIVED to-day, 100 pairs Acme Club Skates, selling at one dollar per pair, at Dodd & Rogers.
THREE HUNDRED boys partook of the dinner in St. Patrick's Hall, last evening. They all enjoyed themselves immensely.
THE Citizen's Skating Rink opened for the season last evening. There was good ice and good music, and a fairly large representation of skaters.
THE Band of the 82nd Battalion will furnish good music at the Excelsior Rink to-morrow (Saturday) evening. A pleasant evening and good ice may be expected.
A LENGTHY and interesting report of the Prince County Liberal-Conservative Convention to hand, but unavoidably crowded out of to-day's issue. It will appear on Monday.
THE outgoing express will be made up every evening at 6 o'clock, and forwarded by special train connecting with Northern Light at Georgetown. The incoming express will be received daily as usual.
GOSPEL ARMY.-Meeting to-night as usual at 8 o'clock; also, a Watch Night meeting from 11 to 12. Doors open at 1.30. Meeting on New Year's Day at 8 p. m. Meetings on Sunday at 9.30 a. m., 3.30 p. m., and 8 p. m.
A MEMBER was in circulation about town this forenoon to the effect that the steamer Worcester had been lost. The report was unfounded. As a matter of fact, the Worcester has been laid up in Boston for several weeks past.
METHODIST BIBLE CHURCH.-There will be a Watch Night service in this Church this evening, at 10.30. On Sabbath next, Rev. J. S. Shelton will preach morning and evening. In the afternoon, at 2.30, the Covenant and Sacramental services will be held.
AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday forenoon a Scott Act offender was convicted and sentenced to two months' imprisonment. To-day, a man who neglected to contribute towards the support of his wife and child, was released on his own recognizance to await the action of the Grand Jury, before whom the matter is to be laid.
IS the proper department of to-day's issue, will be found the announcement of an interesting event which took place in East Boston, on the 23rd inst. Both parties to the contest are well known in this city, and are highly esteemed for their many excellent qualities. In common with their hosts of friends, THE EXAMINER wishes them a happy and prosperous career.
WE regret to learn that the brig, L. J. Westaway, Capt. Buchanan, owned by Mr. D. Farquharson, M. P. P., ran ashore on Hens and Chickens Shoals, about two miles from Delaware Breakwater, during a heavy north east snow-storm, at half-past four o'clock yesterday morning, and became a total wreck. The crew were saved. The L. J. Westaway left here for Philadelphia on the 10th December, with a cargo of potatoes, shipped by Mr. Farquharson. Both cargo and vessel were partially insured.
THE turn-out of the "Horribles" to-morrow promises to be the largest and best ever seen in the city. They will meet at the "Cross Roads," and parade the city from north to south, the boundaries being Euston and Water Street, then east and west, the boundaries being Cumberland and West Streets, giving everyone an opportunity of seeing the procession. All will be mounted on "Island" stock, except the "Judge," who will drive a pair of "Jumbos." They will be commanded by a captain, and two lieutenants, and will perform fantastic movements along the route.
MAN'S INHUMANITY TO WOMAN.-In order to alleviate, as far as possible, any unnecessary suffering imposed upon young women employed in dry goods stores at Halifax, the retail merchants of that city are appealed to by the "Woman's Christian Association," requesting them to provide seats in their stores for the young women in their employ, so that those who employ may rest their weary limbs when not in attendance upon customers. Christian workers in Charlottetown would do well to make a similar appeal in the interests of suffering young women in this city.
THROUGH the courtesy of Mr. A. F. Tomlins we are enabled to publish the following information concerning the business transacted at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court during the year which closes to-day: There were 45 assault cases, 34 convictions and 11 dismissals; abandonment of infant, 1 case, sent to Supreme Court; burglary, 1 case, sent to Supreme Court; brothel keeping, 8 cases, 5 convictions and 3 dismissals; brothel frequenting, 9 cases, 6 convictions and 3 dismissals; breach of Scott Act, 51 cases, 34 convictions and 20 dismissals; breach of city by-laws, 94 cases, 83 convictions and 11 dismissals; disturbing congregations, 6 cases, convicted; drunkenness, 200 cases, 299 convictions and 1 dismissal; breach of fire arms act, 1 case, convicted; house-breaking, 3 cases, 2 convictions and 1 dismissal; breach of inland revenue act, 1 case, convicted; larceny, 18 cases, 9 convictions, 3 sent to Supreme Court and 6 dismissals; malicious Court and 6 dismissals; 16 cases 12 injuries to property, 16 cases 12 convictions and 4 dismissals; breach convictions and shipping act, 1 case, convicted; attempt to murder, 1 case, sent to Supreme Court; obtaining goods under false pretences, 3 cases, sent to Supreme Court; profane, 1 case, sent to Supreme Court; trespass, 1 case, convicted; vagrancy, 25 cases, 21 convictions, and two dismissals-making a grand total of 515 convictions, 14 sent to the Supreme Court, and 62 dismissals. The ordinary fines levied and fees received amounted to \$138.49; fines levied under the Criminal Temperance Act, \$250; Canada's Temperance Act fines in process of collection, \$370; fees from the City Small Debt Court, \$56.10.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Leadership of the Commons.
LONDON, Dec. 30.
The Right Rev. Wm. Henry Smith, Secretary of War, is to take Churchill's place as leader of the Conservatives in the Commons.
Lord Hartington, Joseph Chamberlain and George J. Goschen had a conference to-day. They found themselves equally averse to joining any coalition cabinet, and all three decided to support the Conservative Government.

Political Demonstration.

MONCTON, Dec. 30.
A large and enthusiastic gathering were at the Brunswick Hotel this evening to take part in the national demonstration to Hon. P. A. Landry, M. P. About 200 persons were present. A very representative body of Liberals and Tories, including representatives of the French population of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. I.

Fatal Snowstorm.

BERLIN, Dec. 30.
The removal of the snow, which fell in the late storm, has revealed an appalling loss of life. Many travellers were overtaken by the storm. Fifty bodies have been found in Saxony, 30 in Thuringia and 40 in Southern Germany. It is estimated that the total loss of life will be nearly 200.

An Island Vessel Lost.

DELEWRE BREAKWATER, Dec. 30.
The British brig L. J. Westaway, from Charlottetown, P. E. I., for Philadelphia, grounded on Hens and Chickens to-day. She floated but soon capsized and sank. Her crew was saved by the Henlopen Station crew.

Another Strike.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 30.
The threatened strike among the employes of the various breweries throughout the city was inaugurated this morning, against the reduction of 20 per cent. in wages. The strikers number over 2,000.

Steamer Burned.

MOBILE, Ala., Dec. 30.
News was received here last night of the burning of a steamer used as a boarding house at Jackson. It is supposed that eight or ten white and colored laborers lost their lives in the fire.

Shipping Disaster.

HUNTINGTON, L., Dec. 30.
The schooner Christena Moore, from Windsor, N. S., went ashore at Lloyds Neck. She lies in an easy position and may be got off when weather moderates.

Hartington Declines.

LONDON, Dec. 30.
Lord Hartington has declined to become a member of the Commons.
