MONTREAL, Feb. 22. Sir Donald Smith has cabled his acceptance of the candidature as an independent Conservative for Montreal West.

Big Meeting in Montreal

MONTREAL, Feb. 2. The employees of the Sugar Refinery held a monster meeting here last night, at which Mr. Curran, Ministerialist, made an exceedingly forcible speech on the tariff question. His rebellion-free-trade secession opponent will be very lucky if he saves his deposit.

Blake Afraid.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. Mr. Blake is much afraid of being defeated in his own constituency of West Durham, where free trade is played out, and has decided to run for Nappanee, Ont., and West Bruce.

A Conservative Walk Over.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. The timely letters of Archbishop Tache and of Bishop Laflèche are having a good effect in Berthier, and the Conservatives will have practically a walk over.

Reports from Chambly, Richelieu, Gaspe, Temascouta, Champlain, Levis and all along the line are most encouraging for the Conservatives.

Grits Combining.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1. Grits here are trying to combine on Jary, the Labor Candidate, but have not yet been successful.

Another Ovation to Sir Charles.

MONTREAL, Feb. 2. A special despatch from Halifax says that Sir Charles Tupper received a perfect ovation at Pugwash, and that he made a grand speech, showing up Grit chicanery and hypocrisy, and challenged Hon. A. G. Jones, the Grit candidate, to a public discussion in Halifax.

What Sir John Says.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. Sir John A. Macdonald, in the course of an address to the electors of Kingston, said: "This may possibly be the last occasion on which I will ask the support of any constituency. You may then conscientiously give me your support, for which I will be deeply grateful."

The Prosperity of the Country.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2. At a meeting of manufacturers held last evening, at which addresses were delivered by Sir John A. Macdonald and by Hon. Mr. White, a resolution was passed declaring that the prosperity of the country depended upon the National Policy.

THE WAR SCARE.

France Desires Peace.

Germany Preparing for Action

Panics on the Bourses.

PARIS, Feb. 1. There is a great panic on the Bourse to-day, owing to the political situation. The Premier takes advantage of the opportunity offered to impress upon Germany the most earnest desire of France for peace.

Another Boodler.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. Another one of the "boodler" aldermen has been found guilty and will likely occupy a prison cell for some considerable time. The number of attendants at the Montreal Carnival is thus lessened by another one.

Arrangements Perfected.

LONDON, Feb. 1. The arrangements made for the future custody of Port Hamilton provides for its evacuation by England. It is said that China will permit no other power to occupy any part of Corea.

Newspaper Suspended.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 1. A difference of political opinions among the proprietors is said to be the cause of the suspension of the Star newspaper, which ceased publication with to-day's issue.

Archer Relics.

LONDON, Feb. 1. Relics of Fred Archer, the celebrated English jockey who died last year, were offered at auction to-day and brought fancy prices.

Called to the Senate.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1. The last vacancy in the Senate for Ontario has been filled by the appointment of Mr. McLaughlin, M. P., to the vacant position.

Married by Proxy.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1. Miss Nina VanZant, the young girl who fell in love with the condemned anarchist Spies some few months ago, and who, since

his confinement in jail, has been a constant visitor thereto, was yesterday married by proxy to the condemned man. Justice Englehart, of Chicago, is our authority for the statement.

Board of Trade Matters

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. The Montreal Board of Trade has been presented with a petition to have the time for the navigation of the St. Lawrence lengthened.

With reference to the arrangements for loading, the underwriters and High Commissioner for Canada have been instructed by the Marine Department to look after the matter in London.

A Big Strike.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. The big strike in this city is getting worse, and everything is in a state of demoralization. Almost all business is at a standstill. The results of the strike are felt for thousands of miles around. Ten thousand additional men went on a strike to-day. The outlook is certainly not very promising.

A New Party.

LONDON, Feb. 1. A Churchill Party is being formed by the younger members of the Carleton Club. The St. James' Gazette bitterly denounces Lord Randolph Churchill's action, and says that he is an unprincipled politician, a man who is seeking to further his own ends without the slightest regard for the interests of party.

Knocked in the Head.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. The arrangement for having an English-speaking Mayor for Montreal seems to have been knocked in the head, owing to the Grit machinations at Quebec. It is thought that Hon. Mr. Abbott will be opposed by the Rainville, a rabid Rielite, as a result of the job fixed up in Que bec.

Bad Weather Out West.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. A heavy blizzard is now raging throughout the Western States and Territories. Almost all railway traffic is suspended. The weather is bitter cold, the thermometer fluctuating between 20 and 65 degrees below zero. Terrible losses of ranch stock are reported as a result of the cold snap.

A New Military Order.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1. The Imperial Government has issued an order that all military officers in the Colonial service must look to the Colonies for their employments. All these officers are to have their pay cancelled. This will make a considerable difference in General Middleton's remuneration.

A Broken Cable.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1. The Marine Department has been notified that the French cable has broken in thirty fathoms of water near St. Pierre. The Government steamer Newfoundland has been chartered to make the necessary repairs, and sails for Halifax on Thursday next, 3rd inst.

Forces Annihilated.

ROME, Feb. 1. The whole Italian force in the Sudan, together with their Abyssinian allies, were annihilated at Saati, on the 5th of January last, after three hours hard fighting. The Italian Government is to send reinforcements to the scene of the conflict.

Down on the Chinese.

PORTLAND, O., Feb. 1. While a large number of Chinese were encamped round a big tree near Tamao, N. W. T., yesterday, the tree was blown down and nine were killed and twelve seriously injured. Even the elements appear to be against the poor Mongolian.

Another Insane Actor.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1. An actor named Gerald Maxwell, a prominent member of Wilson Barrett's Dramatic Co., has become insane. Maxwell is a son of Miss Braddon, the well-known novelist. The causes which led to his insanity are not known.

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Army Estimates.

LONDON, Feb. 1. The army estimates this year include the expenses of repeating rifles, and the costs of the defence of home ports.

The Mails Difficulty.

LONDON, Feb. 1. The Government has settled the mails difficulty with the White Star, Cunard and North German Lines.
