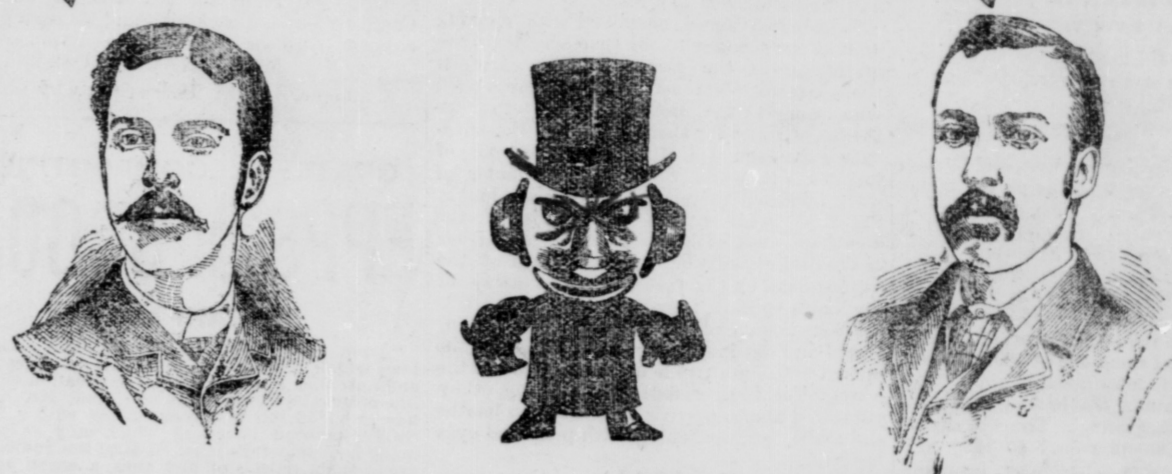

Why He Left Samoa.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 17. John C. Klein, American newspaper correspondent, arrived from Samoa yesterday. He says he left the Islands because he would have remained on an American man-of-war continually, to avoid being seized by Germans.

French Politics.

PARIS, Feb. 17. Meline is experiencing great difficulty in forming a Cabinet. Waldeck, Rousseau and other prominent men have refused to join.

Fast Mail Service.

OTTAWA, Feb. 17. It is understood that the Imperial authorities, before consenting to definite arrangements with the Canadian Pacific for mail service with Japan and China, stipulated that the Canadian Government must subsidize a fast Atlantic service, so that there may be continuous fast service between Great Britain and the East.

Consternation in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Feb. 17. Great consternation was caused in town to-day by the news that C. J. Brydges, Hudson Bay Commissioner, and one of the best known railroad men in Canada, had dropped dead in the streets.

A Majority of One.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Feb. 17. The elections for members of the Legislative Assembly are completed. They resulted in the return of 68 Ministerialists and 69 members of the Opposition.

His Health Improved.

OTTAWA, Feb. 17. The Minister of Railways is considerably improved in health to-day.
