In Memoriam

MARTIN A. McINNIS

The congregation attending early Mass at St. Peter's on Nov. 15 was deeply shocked when it was announced that Martin McInnis had passed away suddenly at the office of Dr. R. A. Buden a few minutes previously. Apparently not feeling as well as usual, he left the church before service commenced and drove, unaccompanied, to the doctor's where he collapsed before receiving attention.

The late Mr. McInnis, who was in his 58th year, was the sole survivor of the family of the late Patrick D. and Mrs. Sarah (Mills) McInnis. Although suffering from a heart condition contracted while serving with the Canadian Navy during World War I, after his discharge he farmed successfully at Cable Head East for some years. On medical advice he sold out his holdings there and moved to St. Peter's where he engaged in various light employment. At the time of his death he was representative of the W. T. Rawleigh Co. and in this capacity he acquired many friends in his section of King's County. Many of them came long distances to pay their last respects.

Although of a reserved manner, he had been a great reader, was an interesting and humorous conversationalist, a general favorite with both young and old and a citizen the community will find hard to replace.

The funeral was held from his late residence on Tuesday morning to St. Peter's Church, St. Peter's, under the auspices of that branch of the Canadian Legion, the members attending in a body. High Mass of Requiem was sung by the pastor Rev. W. V. MacDonald; a full choir was assisted by Mr. D. Jerome Gillis of Charlottetown, a cousin of the deceased. Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley was present in the sanctuary. Rev. Father MacDonald also conducted the service at the grave. Mr. H. B. MacDougall, president of the Legion Branch, read the committal, his former comrades, dropping their poppies in a last farewell salute, concluded the service.

He is survived by his widow Irene (Lewis) and a host of relatives and friends who will remember him.

Pall-bearers were Messrs. Joseph Leslie, Edward Quigley, Arthur MacDonald, Reggie Lewis, Charles McNeill, Hugh McIsaac. May he rest in peace.

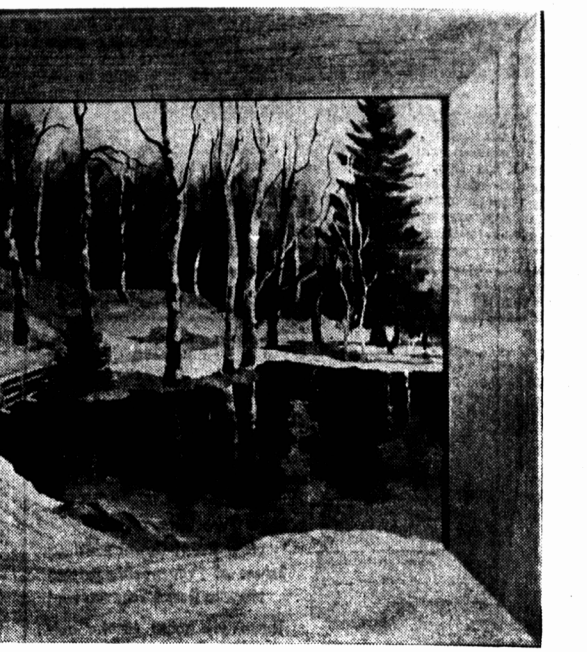
