SUMMERSIDE — Members of the Summerside Town Council last night at the monthly council meeting were unanimous in their feelings that the town had been dealt unfairly in regards to the recent announcement that 100 military housing units would be built at Siemon Park rather than on town property. Council members, Mr. C. George Keys, Jr., said that Central Mortgage, and Housing Corporation had made a commitment that the units would be built in the town and that Summerside had been dealt "quite a blow" when advised that the land was not required. It was recalled that a town site had been chosen in 1962 and that the town had received a commitment from the CMHC that the houses would be erected on this site.

The town, said Coun. Key, had wired CMHC recently and asked when construction of units would begin at town's planning board?

In answer to this telegram CMHC advised that the units were available to us here that is reassessment of military housing in Summerside. The town's completion of small project on station. Consequently no immediate requirement served lands in town."

Coun. Key said the town had spent some \$15,000 in surveying and servicing of the proposed site and added "I feel CMHC owes some consideration on this deal or \$15,000."
