A. C. MACDONALD CONTINUES DEBATE

Mr. J. G. Scrimgeour In- troduced to the House

THE GOVERNMENT SCORED ON
THEIR PROHIBITION POLICY.

Session of Senate - The Pacific Cable
and Other Projects.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, April 12.—Mr. McDonald, of
P. E. Island, resumed the debate, dwell-
ing on the fraud perpetrated in the matter of
the Plebiscite.

He assured the Government that there
was in the country a large body of serious
people who would hold the Government
responsible for their duplicity.

His own country had expressed a strong
opinion in favor of Prohibition and the re-
sult of the reply made to them by the
Government was to establish a private
bonded liquor warehouse a thing that had
not existed before.

The warehouse license was given a man
who had been described as a notorious
viola'or of the Scott Act.

The Senate met last evening for the
first time since Easter and held a short
session.

The Government party held a caucus
and members were informed of four
propositions to be introduced, viz., re-
distribution bill, the address to the Imper-
ial Parliament on Senate reform,
amendments to the Franchise Act, and the
Pacific Cable bill.

It is understood that the Government
propose to increase the share of Canada
from two-ninths of the whole cost as
originally intended to five-eighths
Great Britain is to have a like share and
the other four-ninths will be borne by the
Australasian colonies.

Amendments to last year's Franchise
Bill will probably be an important mea-
sure. It proves to be also, either unwork-
able and it is expected that the amend-
ments will go far to restore the conditions
of the last Franchise Bill, which was re-
pealed last year.
