

Islanders Sweep 2-Game Series With Sydney

Whip Millionaires 3-1 In Sydney; Saindon Gets Two And Gignac One

SYDNEY, (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders moved into third place in the Maritime Major Hockey League with a 3-1 win over Sydney Millionaires here Tuesday night.

It was the second win in two nights for Charlottetown over Sydney. Islanders won 10-3 Monday. Islander moved one point ahead of Glace Bay who lost to Halifax 11-6.

Fine Effort



After a scoreless first period, Charlottetown scored three goals in the second and Sydney one in the third.

Paul Saindon, with a pair, and Gay Gignac scored for Charlottetown and Gordie Marshall for Sydney.

Both teams played close-checking hockey in the first period, with Charlottetown holding a slight edge in the shooting. Norm Defelice, Sydney goalie, made nine stops while Roger Bessette for Charlottetown handled six.

Charlottetown opened up in the second, Saindon scoring in the first two minutes on a play with Don McLaughlin and Claude Robert. Five minutes later Orin Carver passed to Saindon for the second score. Gus Gustavson slipped a pass ahead to Gay Gignac for the final Islanders' score at 14:50.

Bessette was outstanding in the third period, turning aside 13 shots. Charlottetown played defensive hockey in the final period and had only four shots at Defelice.

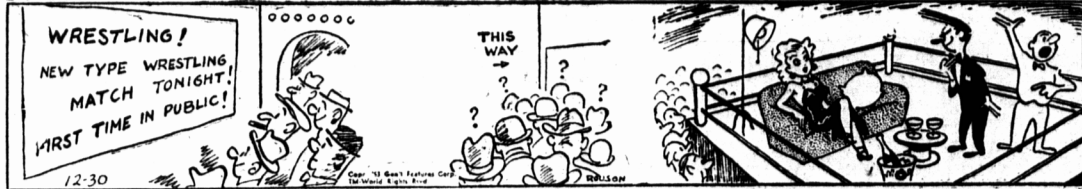

Carruthers will rest for two weeks at home and then re-enter the hospital for completion of the treatment. He said he hoped to be well enough to travel east for several fights early next year.

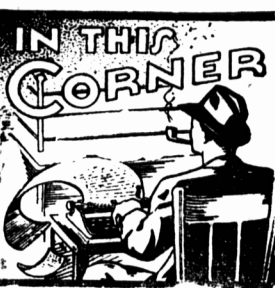

Geoffrion May Lose Up To \$1,100 By Suspension

MONREAL, (CP) — The wallop Montreal Canadiens' Bernie Geoffrion will take in the pocketbook as the result of his stick-swinging duel with Ron Murphy of New York Rangers may reach an estimated \$1,100.

The figure is guess-work but appears reasonable. Neither the National Hockey League nor a club makes public the salaries paid the players. On the same basis of estimation, Murphy's set-back financially may be around \$600.

In the disciplinary action announced Monday by president Clarence Campbell of the NHL, Geoffrion's total suspension was eight games, all against Rangers. Murphy was suspended for five games, all against Canadiens. The players lose pay for games while they are under suspension.

Geoffrion's salary is believed to be somewhere around \$9,000. He will miss about one ninth of the season, for a financial loss of \$1,000. On top of that he incurred an automatic \$100 fine for his match penalty at the time of the ruckus, Dec. 20 in Madison Square Garden.

The new Summerside hockey club, which has been called the Aces, looked as if all the aces were trumps at the Bedeque rink Monday night. For one period the Freetown Royals sat in the driver's seat where they generally can be found, and the chucker ended with the score 2-1 in their favor. But the Bagiole-Schurman aggregation really got under way in the middle frame and there was little doubt about the final outcome from then on in.

Paul Schurman was the kingpin of the Summerside team's attack. His stick wizardry was beautiful to behold, and one of his three goals was a gem of finesse. In Maynard Schurman and Vance Harris he has two very capable wings. We'd like to see this line work on a larger ice surface. We think that will be the No. 1 intermediate line of Island hockey when they get plenty of room to strut their speed.

Of the newcomers, Claude Gaudet, son of the veteran Lippy, impressed us most. Claude racked up three counters. He never lets up, and is no shrinking violet when it comes to bodily contact. Johnny Whalen has put on some weight since last season and promises to be an improved puck carrier. Garth Gay was never better, and his sidekick, Leo Shields is still thumbing his nose at Father Time. If Leo keeps improving, he should be ready for the Islanders when he hits the 40-year-old mark.

Dee Lefurgy, son of an illustrious goal-tender of the days when Summerside had one of the finest senior hockey teams in the Maritimes, turned in a top-notch performance in the nets after a shaky start. The veteran Wally Richards was just the opposite. He was hard to beat in the first frame, but let at least two soft ones drift by him during the remainder of the game.

The newcomers, Henry on defence, and Cameron up front, are still pretty much question marks. They were used sparingly and didn't show a great deal. Henry gives an accurate pass, but lacked aggressiveness. Maybe he is not yet in shape. Allison Farmer is not up to his S.D.U. form of some years ago, but condition may be his trouble too.

A word or two about the new Summerside team called the Warriors. If you feel you'd like to have more than a word or two, get in touch with Joe Perry, the goal keeper of this new team. Joe will tell you in ten thousand words or more just what a classy aggregation of hockey talent this outfit is. We are inclined to agree, but with less enthusiasm. They certainly have some smart players. "Mooney" Gallant, the "Gallop Ghost" can still do a pretty brisk giddy-up down the ice lanes. They say Roy "Chick" Gallant is lining up with the Warriors. Rumor has it that Roy has inked a card with the Aces. We'll let the hockey lawyers settle that one.

Atlantics Batter Glace Bay Miners 11-6 In Wild MMHL Game At Halifax

HALIFAX, (CP) — Halifax Atlantics battered Glace Bay Miners 11-6 in a wild Maritime Major Hockey League game here Tuesday.

Referee Laurie Power handed out 22 penalties, including match misconducts to Halifax's Johnny Morrow and Johnny Lumley of Glace Bay following a wild brawl in the second period.

The win increased Halifax's first-place lead to five points over Sydney Millionaires who lost 3-1 to Charlottetown.

Jackie Hollett, Pete Wywrot and Bill Ford each scored two to lead Halifax. Bob Bowness, Bill Arcand, Ross Watson, Gene Leclerc and Doug McPhee scored singles.

Ed Sandford Sparks Bruins To Win Over N.Y.

NEW YORK, (AP) — Ed Sandford tallied a pair of goals and assisted on two other scores in sparking Boston Bruins to a 6-2 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers at Madison Square Garden Tuesday night before a crowd of 12,482. The Bruins turned a close game into a rout with three goals in the final period.

Sandford, a 25-year-old centre, put the Bruins ahead for good 3-2 at 16:03 of the second period. He scored again at 13:42 of the third period and assisted on Bob Armstrong's tally less than two minutes later that gave Boston a 5-2 margin. Warren Godfrey scored the visitors' final goal at 16:14 of the closing period.

He shot in winning, moved to within five points of third place. The defeat left the Rangers in fifth place.

The game marked the return to action of 33-year-old Edgar Laprade, New York centre who retired two years ago. Laprade turned in such a neat performance that the sports writers picked him at the game's most valuable player.
