and gains on the athletic field and in gate receipts.

I am in receipt of a communication from what is known as Pop Warner Football Conference, Pee Wee Division, Queens County, New York, seeking funds to assist boys 12 to 14 years in competitive sports, to develop sportsmanship, character training and fair play.

The Conference had 150 youngsters with top weight 125 pounds, playing football, and has received national recognition through bowl games sponsored by Lynchburg, Virginia; New Orleans, Louisiana; Omaha, Nebraska and Easton, Pennsylvania.

To equip each boy properly with football gear, supply team insurance and have each youngster submit to a complete physical examination before league play requires money. Whether this money is supplied by private sponsors, the community as an investment in building character, or private funds is not the question. The question is what is it worth to the boys themselves and future manhood to have large groups of boys (and girls also) learning to play unselfishly, always with the team's success in mind, to give and take, to control the temper and to carry on in the game even when undergoing decisive defeat.

Group games conducted by competent supervisors in civic playgrounds costs a community considerable money, but no other investment pays such large dividends.
