

# Probe For Cause Of Airliner Crash

BRAMPTON, Ont. (CP)—Investigators poured over evidence on Saturday seeking the cause of the fiery Friday night crash of a giant, four-engined airliner—show piece of Trans-Canada Air Lines.

The Super Constellation plane, bound for Tampa, Fla., to Toronto's suburban Malton airport, crashed-landed in a frozen farm field about four miles west of here and 20 miles northwest of Toronto. The 16 passengers, including golf star Marlene Stewart of Fonthill, Ont., and seven crew members aboard escaped, but most suffered injuries.

However, Mrs. Eleanor Law of Toronto suffered face and hand burns and Mrs. Edna Laine of Toronto, concussion, burns and a broken nose.

Golfer Marlene Stewart said that there was "a terrific crash, a flash of flame and a hole in the side of the plane."

The 30-year-old holder of the Canadian women's open and closed golf titles was on her way home for Christmas from Rollins College in Florida. Although she suffered burns on her knees and wrist, Marlene walked with five other women passengers to a nearby farm house and helped with the first aid.

The most severely injured were the pilot, Capt. Norman Ramsay, 34, of Vancouver and Montreal; co-pilot Gary Anderson, 22, of Ganouque, Ont., and Montreal; and flight engineer Thomas Gordon Phillips, 34, of Montreal.

Ramsay, who climbed back into the blazing plane to rescue Anderson and Phillips, suffered a fractured skull, chest and thigh injuries and shock. TCA officials said later he was in serious condition. Anderson suffered head injuries, a jagged chest cut, burns and fractures of the left arm and leg. Phillips suffered head and chest injuries and burns.

**NO EVIDENCE YET**

H. W. Seagrims of Montreal, TCA operations general manager, said "no tangible evidence" had been uncovered during the first investigation into the crash cause. He said the airline does not intend to ground its seven other \$1,500,000 Super Constellations immediately but will do so if any serious mechanical defect is discovered during department of transport investigation. The aircraft went into regular TCA service on the Florida run Dec. 4.

Speculation on the crash centred on three main possibilities:

One of the plane's engines may have caught fire, forcing the 66-ton craft to the ground.

The crew may have mistaken the lights of Brampton for those of the airport runway, eight miles to the southwest. Darkness and a sleet storm made visibility uncertain.

An instrument error may have led the pilot to believe the plane was several hundred feet in the air when it belly-landed after its three-hour flight in bad weather.

**KEEP CREW SILENT**

TCA officials said all of the crew members have been ordered by doctors to see no one until further notice.

The story of the crash and its aftermath was graphically told by the passengers.

They said the plane bumped and ground along the field, tearing itself to pieces and strewn wreckage as it went. When it lurched to a halt the passengers hurried to safety through emergency exits and a gaping hole on the right side of the fuselage where a wing had been ripped out by a tree. Seconds later flames engulfed the aircraft.

Crew members were unanimous in their praise of Capt. Ramsay's handling of the doomed plane.

Capt. Ramsay, assisted by stewardess Irene Deruchie, 35, of Montreal, and Samuel Young, 48, of Port Credit, Ont., a passenger, went back and pulled out Anderson and Phillips when a quick head count showed them missing.

**AIDED BY FARMERS**

They were joined by Marlon Doucet, the other stewardess, and fashioned a stretcher for Anderson from seats tossed loose. Aided by farmers they went with eight passengers to a highway, about a mile away, where cars and taxis rushed them to Brampton Hospital. Twelve passengers were taken to Brampton Hospital and 11 to Humber Memorial Hospital in Etobicoke township, a Toronto suburb. Six were released after treatment Friday night. Hospital officials said most of the passenger's injuries were bruises and cuts.

## Strange But True

When Dr. A. H. Herring died at Red Land, La. back in 1885 his dying wish was that his body should be placed in a vault above ground and later moved to Georgia for interment in the family plot.

So, in accordance with the good Doctor's wishes his remains were placed in a metal casket, hermetically sealed and placed in a pine box. The large box was then put in a brick vault above ground and roofed in, the whole being covered with lime cement.

The doctor's body lay in the vault for nearly two years. Why? Because at that time his family decided to leave it where it was and bury it under the sod.

Samuel Eogg, a friend of the Herrings, was asked to superintend the final interment in Red Land Cemetery.

The cement on the roof and sides of the vault was broken up, the bricks were removed and the pine plank beneath was lifted off.

To his amazement the underside of the plank showed wet and discolored and those present were utterly astonished to see on the rough surface a life sized picture of the dead man. The features were rather dim but the entire body was clearly outlined. The large veins showed distinctly against the darker color of the fleshy parts, the lungs were visible and the brain was shown in a whitish shade. No other vital organs were etched in color, but the bony structure of the body, including the ribs, was partly outlined.

Once exposed to the air and sunlight the picture vanished as the moisture on the plank evaporated. The outline of the lungs was the last to fade out. But, the veins remained permanently and were visible on the plank for a week afterward.

The pine shell enclosing the casket also was wet and discolored on the underside of the cover and the party found a second picture similar in size and shape to the first. In this second picture, however, the veins were not visible and the vital organs were not shown in color.

Of the two pictures, the one on the pine plank from the roof of the vault—which had the most solid material between it and the dead body, was the most detailed and complete.
