Record Peacetime Deficit Is Reported By Fleming

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government rolled up a peacetime record budget deficit of \$71,400,000 last fiscal year. The 1961-62 deficit from the 1961-62 year ended March 31.

Nothing to Hide Is Claim By PM

OTTAWA (CP)—A bitter battle of words was waged Monday over an opposition bid for a full-scale Commons debate on the charge of Gen. A. G. L. McLaren that the Columbia River Treaty is a sellout to the United States.

After nearly 2 1/2 hours of procedural wrangling and pre-emptive political arithmetic, Speaker Roland Michener, finally declined to accept either of two Liberal party motions for immediate debate.

"We have nothing to hide," Prime Minister Diefenbaker said at one point. No government has ever been obstructed in the manner which this government has been obstructed by the opposition."

The matter is of national and international importance at a time when the prime minister's election threat to make future debating opportunities appear dim, argued Liberal Leader Pearson.

City Purchase Of Land Opposed By Councillor

"The craziest bit of legislation I have ever seen through this City Council," was the way Councillor H.E. Hyndman termed a resolution to purchase from the Co-op Housing Development a portion of land at a price of \$115,000 which was passed at the regular meeting of the council last night.

Coun. J.P. Nicholson stated that every cent he would be used for some time it was going to cost money to keep it in the city.

UNLOADED ON CITY
He further stated that "it was of the opinion that the city should stay out of the real estate business and that the land was just something that the Co-op people were trying to unload on the city."

Coun. Dorethy Corrigan got into the argument and stated that the land was not to be used for a playground but that she wished to return to Coun. Hyndman, noting that a playground was one of the things the city does need.

It was pointed out that the land could not be serviced with water and sewerage facilities until a pumping station had been built in the area.

LAND FREEZE ASKED
Also coming under the town planning committee was the matter of a request from the government to freeze land bounded by Malpeque Road, Bellevue Avenue, North River Road and the City boundaries.

Coun. Cox stated that he believed that this would be the site of a vocational school and later a regional high school. He said that applications had been received from Keith Pickard to build a bowling alley in the area.

The 1962-63 budget was aimed at keeping a fairly tight rein on the government's spending. The major changes were the introduction of a tax on short-term purchase taxes and minor changes in direct taxation and death duties.

Boy, Youth Die In West S. Floods

HALIFAX (CP)—A boy drowned, a youth was swept away in a flooding river and highway and houses took a beating as floods struck the Maritimes for the second straight weekend.

Up the river, heavy rain fell in some areas Sunday, compelling the evacuation of 15-13 families from their homes.

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At Debert, near Truro, four boys were swept away from their homes by floodwaters. Later in the area several apartment buildings and dwellings.
