BINDER TWINE

The Kingston Whig announces that a huge consignment of the Kingston penitentiary brand of binder twine has been shipped west to be sold to the farmers at rock bottom prices. Why, may we ask, has not a consignment of this twine, at rock bottom prices, been sent East as well as West? United States manufacturers of twine and their agents seem to have it all their own way here. Of course there is soon to be an election; for if not, the government would not have departed from its custom of selling binder twine to favored contractors and letting them have a big "rake off" at the farmers' expense!

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Advices from Nova Scotia indicate light crops of hay, potatoes, grain and turnips, but an abundant crop of fruit.

—The casualties at Victoria Park yesterday were not serious in any case. They resulted from hard marching and hot weather, and are not likely to occur again.

—Mr. R. E. Palmer, C. E., whose advancement in his profession is referred to in another column, is a son of Charles Palmer, Esq., of this city. We extend THE EXAMINER'S hearty congratulations.

—Reports to the Fisheries department at Ottawa indicate that there is considerable dynamiting of fish in the neighborhood of Grand Manan. Captain Spain will send one of the cruisers to investigate.

—Mr. Richard Croker remarks that in the United States 80 per cent of the people are governed by 20 per cent. And such as Mr. Richard Croker govern the 20 per cent. This is true liberty as worked out by United States methods.

—It is remarked by the Gazette that the frauds in the voting on the plebiscite were much dwelt on at the Dominion Alliance meeting at Toronto. In one thing the Tories can sympathize with the "drys." They have each suffered cruelly from the Liberal "machine."

—With the new bridge on Brighton Road, there is in course of erection an old fence on the adjoining lot. The fence is remarkable for the ancient historical and biographical records by which it is adorned. But, like the shady acts of our Provincial Government, it needs a coat of white wash.

—Judge Dugas, recently from Dawson, thinks that Yukon will produce gold in astonishing quantities when the cost of exploration and production is reduced by the reduction of the cost of provisions and labor, and when new routes have been opened up. He thinks that quite \$15,000,000 gold must have been taken out of the country last year.

—According to the St. John Sun-Ottawa correspondent, it is confidently expected that in the autumn a communication will be received from the government of Trinidad asking for reopening of negotiations looking to closer trade relations between Canada and Trinidad. It will be remembered that at the time Mr. Fiending delivered his budget he made a great hurrah over the offer which Canada had made to Trinidad with a view to the consummation of a reciprocity treaty between the two countries. Trinidad, however, turned to the United States rather than to Canada and expected to get better terms from the republic than she could from this country. The convention agreed upon between the United States and Trinidad was not ratified by the American senate, and as the period of ratification expires in August and congress will not meet before December, the deal may be considered off. The United States asked for an extension of one year within which to ratify the treaty, but this was refused. Mr. Robertson, a member of the legislative council of Trinidad, when in Ottawa the other day, stated he had no doubt that on the return of the members of that body from Europe in September they would immediately take up the question of a treaty with Canada.

MR. PALMER GOES TO SPAIN

Called Thither to Act as Engineer,
For the Rio Tinto.

(Roseland Miner, July 15.)

Mr. R. E. Palmer and family left yesterday for Charlottetown, P. E. Island, Mrs. Palmer and the three children will remain there for the summer, while Mr. Palmer will sail from New York, via London, for the Rio Tinto mines in Spain, whither he goes as mining engineer in charge of the underground department. The Rio Tinto is the largest copper mine in the world, employing 12,000 men. Mr. Palmer has been mining engineer for the Le Roi mines, and British America Corporation for two years while Mr. W. A. Carlyle was the general manager, and did his work so well that Mr. Carlyle now sends for him to take a similar position with him there. Mr. Palmer is a graduate of the McGill University of Montreal. He graduated in 1887 with the degree of Bachelor of Applied Science. From that time until 1894 Mr. Palmer practised the profession of civil engineer in Canada and the United States, being connected with large railway drainage, hydraulic and other works. Considerable of this time was in mining sections. From 1894 until the present time he has exclusively engaged in mining engineering in Colorado, Montana, British Columbia and elsewhere. Mr. Palmer's specialty is the geology of mining and he has devoted a great deal of attention to that branch. He is also an expert in underground equipment and construction, such as installing machinery and timbering. In addition to this he is possessed of executive ability of a high order, which fits him peculiarly for handling the best advantage large numbers of men.

Mr. Palmer during the two years' stay in Roseland made a host of friends, who regretted to see him depart for a foreign country, but at the same time they recognized the fact that he went to better himself.

The appointment of Mr. Palmer to the important position with the Rio Tinto Company is quite an honor for Canada. Mr. Carlyle must be satisfactory to his new employers when they would consent to have him send here for another Canadian engineer, and a graduate of the same university as Mr. Carlyle to fill so important a post. It shows that Canadian mining engineers are in demand on the other side of the water. This is because they thoroughly understand their business.

The Quarantined Steamer.

QUEBEC, July 20.—Every possible precaution is being taken to prevent the spread of smallpox contagion from the French steamship *Mont Blanc*, now at quarantine, and the vessel will not be released from Grosse Isle until it is certain that she possesses no further element of danger to the community. Since the 2nd of July no new case has declared itself amongst those on board the vessel. The immigrants who presented any symptoms of the disease at that time are now all convalescing. All the belongings of the Syrian immigrants, amongst whom the disease had declared itself, have been burned; all the passengers, and all the crew have been vaccinated; all the cargo and every part of the ship have been carefully disinfected, and no precaution known to medical and sanitary science has been neglected by Dr. Montzambert and his staff of quarantine officials. The vessel will shortly proceed to Montreal.
